Preface

The Income & Expenditure Survey was held from April to June 2006 and is the third survey of this kind held by the CBS Aruba. It covers expenditures made up from a year back in time to more frequent expenditures captured in the Daily Expenditures Book. Information on income and expenditure of households serves a large number of uses and users. The Income and Expenditure Survey (I&ES) provides information on household income and expenditures, it measures levels and changes in the living conditions of the people, it observes the consumption patterns of the households and it is used to compute amongst others the weights used in calculating the consumer price indices. The information is broadly used by government departments, private organizations, researchers and the community as a whole.

Since the last I&ES held in 1998 a lot has changed concerning income and expenditures of the households. New products entered the market, other products are out of market, the population composition has changed and so do the consumption patterns. This edition of the I&ES includes the introduction of the internationally used COICOP-codes, based on the European standard Classification of Individual Consumption by Purpose, or COICOP. The COICOPAUA is used as the basis for distinguishing goods and services and thus revising the product list for the weights for calculating the price index. This new coding makes it possible to display the goods and services in much more detail. The implementation of this new classification took a very long time and has created a backlog in presenting the results of the 2006 Income & Expenditure Survey. As a supplement to the I&ES 2006, an Economic Wellbeing Survey was held during September-October 2006, revisiting the households that participated in the I&ES. Some of the findings hereof are presented in the highlights. Other important results and findings regarding household income and expenditure will be presented in a number of papers scheduled later this year.

The Income and Expenditure Survey was a success thanks to the I&ES-team, consisting of the CBS staff, the team of interviewers and verifiers. A word of appreciation goes to the surveyed population for their input.

Figure 1. Expenditures by sector, 1998-2006 (relative)





Figure 2. Expenditures by sector, 1998-2006 (absolute)



Highlights

Personal income

The average personal income from employment in 2006 was calculated at Afls.2,731 per month. Overall, the average personal income from employment increased by 12.5 percent since the last held Income and Expenditure survey in 1998. In 2006 1,034 employed persons were interviewed of which 1,011 incomes were recorded. While their mean gross monthly income was Afls.2,731, the median (i.e. the mid-point when all employed persons are ranked in ascending order of income) was considerably lower at Afls.2,200 (table 1). This difference reflects the typically asymmetric distribution of income where a large number in the population have relatively low incomes and a smaller number of persons have relatively very high incomes.

Income inequality can be measured by comparing the share of income received from employment by each percentile. Income percentiles are formed by ranking the population in ascending order according to the income of each income unit, and dividing the population into ten equally sized groups. The degree of inequality in the income distribution of all employed persons increased between 1998 and 2006. The most dramatic change is in the share of total income received by the lower tenth percent and the higher tenth percent of the income groups. The lower ten percent of the income groups dropped with 9.5 percent during the eight years (figure 1). The highest ten percent increased with 16.6 percent.

In order to compare the income from employment and the purchasing power of this income in 2006 with that of 1998, the income from employment is adjusted with the inflation during that period. If the income from employment stays the same, but the price level increases, the purchasing power of income falls. It is clear that all income levels are affected by inflation, causing a significant drop in purchasing power. The

lesser tenth percent has seen a major backlog. For the Afls.1,100 that they had to spend in 1998, in 2006 this was equal to Afls.782 which represents 28.5 percent less in purchasing power.

Unlike in 1993 and 1998 the income distribution is negative for the lesser tenth percent of the income groups. In all the income groups the income from employment show an increase (figure 1).




Figure 3. Income distribution of employed persons, 1998-2006

The male employed population has a higher personal income from employment than the female population. The men earn on average Afls.3,131 per month while the women earn an average of Afls.2,301 per month. Levels of income are related to age category. Income tends to be low in the younger age categories, both for male and female, as young people enter the labor market. The average personal income from employment is the highest among those between the ages of 50 and 59 years for men and between 40 and 49 years for women.

Considering the educational level attained, the majority of persons interviewed have a MAVO (or equivalent) degree (secondary education). Persons with the highest personal income from employment are those with a university degree or higher. Persons with a MAVO degree or less earn less than the overall average of Afls.2,731 per month.

Of the 1,011 employed persons who reported their monthly gross income, 14.3 percent (145) indicated they have received tips. The average income from employment for these 145 persons is Afls.2,128 and they received on average Afls.254 from tips. The average income from employment for women who received tips is considerably lower than for men. Considering the occupation of these persons, the majority of men and women (42.8 percent) work as 'service workers and shop and market sales workers'. In this occupational group the women earn on average Afls.350 less than the men. Even the tips received are lower for women in this category. The men reported an average of Afls.459 on tips while the women reported Afls.243 on tips. The elementary occupations are the second largest group within the group of employed persons receiving tips. The majority of persons in this group are female and they reported an average of earnings of Afls.1,424 compared to Afls.1,184 for men. Tips in this category is about Afls.186.

Afls.3,078 from income from their primary job and an additional average of Afls.1,177 from their second job. The women on the other hand, receive an average of Afls.1,680 from their primary job and an average of Afls.894 from their second job.

In the Income and Expenditure Survey people were to report any other sources of income other than from employment of their primary job, tips or from a second job. A total of 132 employed persons reported both their income from employment and income from other sources. Other sources included among others income from odd jobs, income from property rental, widow's pension, income from AOV-pension or other forms of pension schemes and orphan's pension. The average income from other sources is Afls.739.

Household income

The household income is calculated by adding up the income from all members of the household who contribute in one way or the other to the overall household income. The households cover a wide variety of individuals, ranging from different age groups, sex, employment status and household types.

In the 2006 income and expenditure survey a total of 817 households were successfully interviewed, with a total of 2,294 persons. The average household size in 2006 is calculated at 2.8 persons per household. The largest group of households in the survey exist of married couples with children. They comprise 29.5 percent of all households. The second largest group is formed by the one person households, totaling 151 households, which is 18.5 percent. Of all households the average household income is Afls.4,227 and the median household income is Afls.3,500.

The income of the different household types is related to the size and composition of the households. Married couples with child(ren) with an average of 2 persons contributing to the household income and an average household size of 3.8 persons (table 4), have the highest average income of Afls.5,747.

A low and high income group is defined by using the median income, which is the value that divides the higher half of the population from the lower half. Of the 151 one person households, 80.1% (121 households) earn less than the overall median household income. These 121 households are thus considered as the low income group. Of the 'married couples with children' households, 68.9 percent earn more than the overall median household income. In this case the 166 'married couples with children' are considered as being in the high income group.

Income inequality can also be examined using a summary measure, the gini-coefficient. The gini-coefficient ranges between a value of zero when income is equally shared by all households, and a value of one when all income is received by a single household. The gini-coefficient in 1998 was 0.41. In 2006 the gini-coefficient remained the same at 0.40.



Household expenditures


The household expenditures for the 817 interviewed households totaled on average Afls.4,201.76 per month per household. About 40 percent of the household expenditures goes to Housing (incl. water and electricity). About 14 percent of these expenditures on housing is for electricity payments and 8 percent for the water bill. The second largest household outlay is transport, which includes the purchase of a new car and gasoline, representing respectively 37.4% and 26.7% of this sector. Of the total household expenditures 8.4 percent is spend on food and non-alcoholic beverages for consumption at home.

Even when controlling the household expenditures for income class (median set at Afls.3,500), the distribution of the expenditures remains almost the same. The majority of expenses are made for Housing (incl. water and electricity) and Transport in both low and high income classes. The difference lies in the remaining expenditures. Households in the high income class spend primarily on 'Recreation and culture' and 'Miscellaneous goods and services' than on "Food and non-alcoholic beverages". Households in the low income class rather spend on 'Food and non-alcoholic beverages'.

To complement the Income and Expenditure Survey an Economic Wellbeing Survey (EWS) was held in October 2006 among the participating households. Not all households were revisited during the EWS, as some of the households could not be reached due to many different reasons. Of the valid answers of the low income class households in the EWS, 54.4 percent indicated that their expenditures on water supply were heavy to being an extremely heavy burden on their budget. While of the valid high income class households 59 percent reported their expenditures on water supply as being heavy to an extremely heavy burden. Of the valid low income class households, 67.3 percent reported to be heavy to extremely heavy burdened by the electricity expenses. For the high income class this was 72.6 percent.

Purpose and Methodology

Information on income and expenditure of households serves a large number of uses and users. The Income & Expenditure Survey provides information on household income and expenditures, it assesses levels and changes in the living conditions of the people, it observes the consumption patterns of the households and it is used to compute among other the relative weights for products and services used in the calculation of the consumer price indices. The information is broadly used by governmental departments, private organizations, researchers and the community as a whole. The 2006 Income & Expenditure Survey is the third survey of this kind and the fieldwork of the survey was conducted from April to June 2006.

Households provided information about the household composition, personal incomes and certain recurring payments (e.g. rent, water and electricity bills) and in maintaining a detailed expenditure record for 14 consecutive days, starting on a Sunday. In addition to expenditure and income data, the Income & Expenditure Survey collects information on characteristics of the households and its members, e.g. composition, size, activity status, level of education and age of the members of the household. The most significant change in terms of reporting expenditure however, is the introduction of the international classification system for consumption (COICOP). The Standard Classification of Individual Consumption by Purpose of Aruba is based on the European Standard Classification of Individual Consumption by Purpose, or COICOP. Both the 1993 and 1998 Income & Expenditure Survey were based on the classification used by the CBS Netherlands Antilles in their previously held Income & Expenditure Survey in 1981.

Two questionnaires were used in the Income & Expenditure Survey in order to give a better insight in the household expenditure pattern. The retrospective questionnaire covers both one-time purchases and regular payments incurred a month thru a year prior to the survey. The retrospective questionnaire consisted of the following ten forms:

- Form 1: general information on the members of the household, e.g. sex, age, country of birth,
 level of education and some health indicators.
- Form 2: characteristics of the residence and expenditures on housing. The majority of questions
 were to enable the calculation of the imputed rentals of owners occupying their main residence
 and actual rentals paid by tenants or subtenants. Expenditure on housing included:
 - maintenance and repairs inside and outside the residence,
 - expenditures for new construction or an extension to the residence and

- payments for leasehold/property rent, property tax, electricity bills, water bills, gas for household use, sewage collection and disposal, garbage collection and disposal and security services.
- Form 3: expenditures made for furnishing and household goods, including:
 - the purchase of furniture and furnishings, carpets and other floor coverings,
 - o household textiles,
 - o household appliances (including installation costs, delivery and warranty),
 - o glassware, tableware and household utensils,
 - o tools, equipment and accessories for house and garden,
 - goods and services for routine maintenance,
 - domestic services and household services and
 - gardens, plants and flowers.
- Form 4: expenditures made for clothing, footwear and accessories
- Form 5: expenditures made for health care (products and services)
- Form 6: expenditures made for transport and communication.
- Form 7: expenditures made for recreation, culture and development
- Form 8: expenditures made for miscellaneous goods and services not mentioned elsewhere (including expenses for insurances, personal care, animals as pets, charity and gifts, financial aid and money transfer)
- Form 9: own produce. Recording the use of animals and vegetables and fruit of own production for own consumption.
- Form 10: person form, which includes level of education currently following, expense for (non-commercial) properties, loans, employment and unemployment characteristics and income on a personal basis.

In addition to the retrospective questionnaire, each individual in the household is asked to keep diary records of daily expenditure for two consecutive weeks in a daily expenditure book provided by the CBS. This daily expenditure book includes all daily purchases of all members of the household including items such as food and beverages (for consumption at home and outside the home), newspapers, personal care products and nonprescription drugs. These expenses were recorded by item, brand, store, weight and cost.

Fieldwork and Non-response

The fieldwork of the survey was conducted during April to June 2006 by a group of 26 interviewers. In order to obtain the information on a sample of at least 600 households the CBS calculated that every interviewer should interview 10 households during each two-week period, given the 38 percent of non-response during the 1998 I&ES. During these 8 weeks the interviewers were thus to monitor 10 households in a 2 week period each, totaling 40 households by the end of the survey. Each interviewer received a set of 30 households to canvas during each two-week period. Each set of 30 households were chosen by simple random sampling method, beginning with the first set of 10 households, followed by two separate sets of 10 households each of backup households. At the beginning of each two week period the interviewers canvassed their area during the preceding weekend. As the recording of the daily expenditure book was to begin by Sunday, the interviewers tried to interview the first ten households up to three times during Friday and Saturday. In case of an unsuccessful household the interviewer was instructed to visit the next household in line in the particular order in which they were listed. By Monday each interviewer would have at least 10 households who filled a retrospective questionnaire and willing and available to complete the daily expenditure book for two weeks.

Figure 6. Canvassed addresses




Provided that each interviewer had to return with at least 10 interviews by Monday, increased the number of households who were categorized as 'never home' drastically compared to other surveys. In total 2,202 addresses were canvassed of which the interviewers located 1,940 (88.1%) addresses. The other addresses were either uninhabited (4.3%), could not be found (3.9%), a business location

(2.1%), or were houses belonging to a tourist, were under construction or were not suitable for an interview ('other reason' 1.6%). The 1,940 addresses found amounted to 2,054 households, as some of the addresses consisted of more than one household.

Of the 2,054 households, there were 754 (36.7%) of whom never had someone at home at the time of the visit. As mentioned before, this number is much higher compared to other surveys. In total 363

households (17.7%) refused to cooperate with the survey, reasons varying from lack of understanding of the importance of such a survey, too time-consuming and worries about possible breach of privacy.

A total of 948 households (45.6%) agreed to participate in the survey, of which in the end 817 households gave their full cooperation and 123 started but did not complete the survey.

True non-response are considered to be the households that refused to participate or started but did not finish the survey, which was equal to 486

households. The non-response rate was 23.7 percent compared to the non-response in 1998 of 38 percent.

Concepts and Definitions

CONSUMPTION

The activity of consumption consists of the non-productive use of goods and services for the satisfaction of individual or collective human needs or wants. In this survey consumption is recorded on acquisition basis. The acquisitions variant of the expenditure approach defines expenditures as the value of the goods and services which households purchase at the time those goods or services are actually acquired.

Consumption expenditure of households covers:

- a. Purchases of goods and services;
- b. Goods and services received as income in kind;
- c. Produce on own account which includes the imputed values of the housing services from owner-occupied dwellings. (The housing services produced are deemed to be equal in value to the rentals that would be paid on the market for accommodation of the same size, quality and type.)

The following outlays are excluded from the consumption expenditure:

- a. Direct taxes:
- b. Pension fund contributions and social security;
- c. Interests paid;
- d. Current transfers received;
- e. Investments, including improvements and expansions of own residence;
- f. Extended loans:
- g. General health insurance (AZV).

REFERENCE PERSON

The reference person is the member of the household who is either:

- The legal owner of the housing unit;
- The person responsible for paying the rent, or
- The oldest among all candidates, where the reference person in a housing unit cannot be determined. This occurs, for instance, in combined ownership and rent-free housing units.

The reference person is most commonly used as the person to whom the relationship of all other household members is established.

HOUSEHOLD

A household may either be:

- a. A one-person household, i.e., a person who provides his or her own food or other basic essentials, without teaming up with any other person to form part of a multi-person household or
- b. A multi-person household, i.e., a group of two or more persons living together which makes common provision for food or other essentials for living.

A criterion, to determine whether persons belong to the same household is to detect whether these persons use a common room. Another important indicator is that the persons share their meals. In respect to live-in housemaids in the I&ES, we must note that they are considered as a separate household. Independent on whether or not the housemaid has her own quarters where she lives, separately and almost independently, after her daily work.

Examples of households:

- A person living alone (a one-person household)
- A father or mother with one or more children (man/ woman with children)
- A family consisting of a father, a mother and one or more children (married couple with/ without child(ren))
- A man and a woman living together and one or more children (not married couple with/ without child(ren))
- A man and a woman with their child(ren) living together with the parents of the woman, they are all related to each other (extended family)
- A man and a woman with their child(ren) living together with a sister of the woman and at least one unrelated person (the sister's boyfriend), (composite household)

During the I&ES certain types of households are not interviewed:

- Collective households: such as elderly homes, hospital, prison, etc.;
- Households consisting of more than 13 persons;
- Households consisting of persons not suitable for an interview: alcoholics, drug addicts, mentally unstable persons, etc. as it is difficult to collect reliable information from these persons;
- Tourists who stay less than 1 year on the island;
- Households residing less than 6 months on the island.

HOUSEHOLD TYPE

This classification is based on family groups. In this Income and expenditure survey a household type may be:

A one-person household

- A married couple with no child(ren)
- A married couple with child(ren)
- An extended household
- A composite household
- A single parent with child(ren)

INCOME

The Income and Expenditure Survey only covers the gross income. Gross income is the total income before deductions of own contributions and additions on employer's social contributions. We distinguish the following three forms of income:

- Wages and salaries and employer's contribution to social security and gross entrepreneurial income of own enterprise;
- Income from odd jobs (only if odd job is on a regular basis);
- Income from property rental (houses, apartments), excl. costs;
- Income from interests (savings account, time deposits), investments and stocks (capital);
- Current transfer received and other receipts such as widow's pension, orphan's pension, old age pension, welfare, alimony and child allowance.

The personal income is calculated from the following sources:

- a. For the employed population it comprises income from salary, income from a second job and/or tips and income from other sources.
- b. For the not-employed population income is calculated from receipts from other sources.

The total household income is the sum of a + b of all members of the household.

In addition to income we have to do with certain receipts, which are not included in the income:

- Retainer income (VUT, golden handshake, cessantia, lumpsum);
- Any type of insurance benefits (incl. life-, car- and fire insurance);
- Tax/AOV/AZV return payments;
- Cash gifts (as financial aid) and non-cash gifts from persons not belonging to the household);
- Lottery prizes;
- Inheritance;
- Sale of property;
- Loans received;
- Loan payments received;
- · Compensation from suffering.

COICOPAUA

For the 2006 I&ES a new expenditure classification has been adopted. This new classification is based on the international standard Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose (COICOP) and has been adapted to suit Aruban conditions (COICOPAUA). The use of the COICOP is highly recommended by the International Labour Organization. In the Seventeenth International Conference of Labour Statisticians the following is recommended in the Resolution concerning household income and expenditure statistics.

"The Seventeenth International Conference of Labour Statisticians,

Recognizing the need to revise and supplement the recommendations concerning household income and expenditure surveys contained in the resolution of the Twelfth International Conference of Labour Statisticians (1973),

Wishing to promote the development and use of household income and household expenditure statistics along sound lines and also to promote consistency in their measurement as well as improvement in their quality and international comparability, ..."

"... Household expenditures should be reported in such a way as to permit their classification in various ways to meet different analytical and descriptive purposes. They should be classified in a way that is meaningful for analysis at national level, especially for purposes of compiling consumer price indices. However, to enhance international comparability, national classification systems of household expenditures should, as much as possible, be compatible with the Classification of Individual Consumption according to Purpose (COICOP), at least at the division level. Wherever possible, information should be available for regrouping expenditures into relevant COICOP categories at least at the group (three-digit) level."

Adaptations in the COICOPAUA:

- Food and beverage consumption outside the home
- Other medical treatments (incl. treatments by practitioner(s) of alternative medicine, corrective eye surgery, botox treatment, breast augmentation/reduction, facelift, tummy tuck, etc.)
- Other health related incurred costs (expenditures made for transport, accommodation and meals and beverages while abroad for medical treatment)
- Holidays (abroad and local)
- Party and special occasions products and services (in particular birthday parties, celebration of baptism, holy communion, weddings, Christmas and carnival)
- Exclusion of money transfers in the sector "Miscellaneous goods and services".

Table A.1. shows the expenditures per household in 2006 by the new COICOPAUA coding. Of the interviewed households they spend on average Afls.4,201.76 per month. The major sector of expenditures is 'housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels'. About 40 percent of all expenses is spent on this sector.

Compared to 1998 the sector 'housing' is still the largest outlay for the households. Relatively speaking it seems that the households spend less on 'food' and more on 'transport and communication', even though the household size reduced from 3.17 in 1998 to 2.81 in 2006. Overall, the households spend on average 12.1 percent more per month than in 2006, respectively Afls. 3,746.76 in 1998 and Afls.4,201.76 in 2006.

A low and a high income group is defined by using the median income, which is the value that divides the higher half of the population from the lower half. The median income is calculated at Afls.3,500, e.g. households in the low income class category have less than Afls.3,500 per month in income. The priorities on expenses are clearly different for the low and high income classes. Both the classes spend the majority of their budget on 'housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels'. The low income class spends about 46.6 percent of their budget in this sector, while the high income class spends 36.1 percent. The second largest outlay for both classes is the 'transport' sector, 11.3 percent of the total budget of the low income class and 16.5 percent of that of the high income class respectively. About 10 percent of the expenses of the low income class goes to 'food and non-alcoholic beverages'. The high income class spends less than 10 percent on this sector.

Compared to the Income and Expenditure Survey held in 1998 the distribution of the income classes by spending pattern remained almost the same. The low income class spends the most on 1. 'housing (incl. water and electricity)', 2. 'transport' and 3. 'food and non-alcoholic beverages' in that particular order. The high income class on the other hand still spends the most on 1. 'housing (incl. water and electricity)', 2. 'transport' and 3. 'recreation and culture'.

Note: the discrepancy in the sector 'Miscellaneous goods and services' comparing the 1998 and 2006 I&ES, is the exclusion of 'international money transfers' in this sector in 2006. In the 'Household budget surveys in the EU: methodology and recommendations for harmonization, 1997", the following is recommended:

"... As to transfers in money between households, However, it is not a question of expenditure intended for consumption by the household concerned, and theoretically it would be advisable to take no account of it. (page 49)"

For comparison purposes the expenditures are recorded in table C.1. and C.2. according to the product and services classification used in 1998.

Noteworthy changes in consumption patterns are the increase in the sector 'housing' and 'transport and communication'. In the sector 'housing' the major increases in expenses are for 'property rent' (increased with 22.7%), 'electricity' (an increase of 53.4%) and 'water supply' (an increase of 34.7%). In the 'transport and communication' sector the increase is mainly due to the 'purchase of a new car (an increase of 54.0%), 'gasoline' (increased with 58.5%) and the more extensive use of cellular phones (an increase of 780%).

Note: the relative growth of expenditures per household in 1998 and 2006 for the 'health' sector show a major increase. This is mainly due to a more extensive questionnaire on health expenses in 2006 than in 1998.

Table D.1. compares the expenses made in 1998 with the expenses made in 2006, corrected for inflation. Thus the amount of Afls.5,302 spend in 2006 on food, has a real value of Afls.4,544. The amount is corrected for inflation in order to make a fair comparison between 1998 and 2006. This means that if no inflation has occurred during these five years, the expenses on the 'food' sector would have been Afls.4,544.

Comparison of household expenditure data in real or constant prizes makes use of the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Real expenditures take into account different relative price changes by deflating nominal expenditure - i.e. removing the effects of inflation - and expressing expenditure in guilders of a particular point in time. Relative price movement differences can sometimes be the reason why households spending pattern change over time. Other reasons include changes in supply or demand such as greater product diversity or changing consumer tastes.

Table D.1. is corrected for inflation, and provides the relative growth of the sectors. This means that even though table C.1. shows an increase of 2.8 percent on 'food', when correcting for inflation, this same sector shows a decrease of 11.9 percent.

Table D.1. and E.1. show the relative growth of expenditures between 1998 and 2006 corrected for inflation. Table D.1. shows the considerable changes of household expenditures patterns when taking inflation into account. Table E.1. takes both inflation and the household size into account. For example, even though table C.1. shows an increase of 2.8 percent for the 'food' sector, when correcting for inflation and household size the expenditures for this sector decreased with 0.3 percent. The Afls.1,893 spend in the 'food' sector is equivalent to Afls.1,623 when corrected for inflation and household size. Consequently, the average person spends almost 0.3 percent less on 'food' in 2006 compared to 1998.

The results shown in the previous tables give an overall view of the fluctuations in the expenditures made by the households. Tables F.1. and F.2. reflect the relation between the household size and the expenditures made by the different households. One-person households and large households (5 persons or more) do not have the same expenditure pattern as more frequently observed households (2-3 persons per household).

For example; a one-person household spends about 45 percent of the household's budget on 'housing (incl. water and electricity)', whereas a large household (>5 persons) spends relatively more than other household types on 'food and non-alcoholic beverages'. About 12 percent of the expenditures of a large household goes to this sector compared to 7 and 8 percent for smaller households.
