Consumer Price Index, base period December 2006

June 2013

The Central Bureau of Statistics presents the most important findings for the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the month of June 2013.

The CPI for June 2013 is 117.44, an increase of 0.2% compared to the index of May 2013 (117.17) and accumulating an increase of 0.5% up to and including June of this year.

The percentage change of the CPI over the last 12 months (June 2012 to June 2013) is -3.1, a decrease of 4.0 percentage points (ppts) compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (0.9).

The period average percentage change of the CPI for the period June 2012 - June 2013 is -2.8, a decrease of 7.6 ppts compared to the period average percentage change over the period June 2011 - June 2012 (4.8).

During this month, nine of the twelve sectors registered increases in prices. The increases which had the greatest influence on the CPI were registered for the "Transport" sector (0.5%), "Clothing and footwear" sector (1.1%) and the "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" (0.3%), causing an effect of respectively 0.10, 0.05 and 0.04 ppts. The increases in the remaining sectors had a total effect of 0.05 ppts on the CPI of June 2013.

Aforementioned increases were partially offset mainly by a decrease in the index for the "Health" sector (-0.3%), which had an influence of -0.01 ppt.

The increase in the "Transport" sector was mainly due to increases in the categories "Transport services" (5.6%) and "Operation of personal transport equipment" (0.3%), which contributed to an effect of 0.07 ppts and 0.03 ppts, respectively. The increase in the "Clothing and footwear" sector was caused by an increase in the category "Clothing" (1.4%), causing an effect of 0.06 ppts. The increase in the "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" sector was caused by an increase in the category "Food" (0.5%), which contributed to an effect of 0.06 ppts.

The decrease in the "Health" sector was mainly caused by a decrease of 0.4% in the category "Medical products, appliances and equipment".

The consumption basket of the CPI consists of 452 goods and services. Compared to May 2013, 35.2% of these products had an increase in price, causing an effect of 0.54 ppts, while 34.9% showed a decrease, contributing to an effect of -0.30 ppts and the remaining 29.9% had no change in price. The prices of goods increased by 0.2% and caused an influence of 0.12 ppts. The prices of services show an increase of 0.3% and had an influence of 0.12 ppts.

The CPIC (core inflation) - CPI excluding the effect of energy and food - registered in June 2013 a decrease of 0.2%, which is 2.0 ppts lower compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (1.8%). The energy index - which consists of the products: electricity, water, gasoline and diesel - registered a decrease of 11.8%, which is 26.2 ppts lower compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (14.4%). The food index shows an increase of 0.3%, which is 5.0 ppts lower compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (14.4%).

The subsistence level for a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years) in June 2013 is Afl. 4,278, a decrease of Afl. 168, compared to June 2012 (Afl. 4,446), while for a single adult household the amount is Afl. 2,037, a decrease of Afl. 80, compared to June 2012 (Afl. 2,117).

Change in prices of crude oil, utilities, gasoline and diesel in June 2013

The prices of utilities (electricity and water), gasoline and diesel are for the greater part determined by international crude oil prices. In June 2013 the average price per barrel of crude oil (US\$ 95.77) had an increase of US\$ 1.38 (1.5%) compared to May 2013 (US\$ 94.39).

Fuel surcharge for a usage of electricity up to 500 kWh did not change in June 2013, it stayed at Afl. 24.60 cents per kWh. Fuel surcharge for a usage of electricity between 501 -1000 kWh did not change in June 2013, it stayed at Afl. 30.90 cents per kWh. The prices of electricity and water did not change compared to May 2013. Subsequently, the average electricity price per household remained at Afl. 306.75, while the average price of water per household remained at Afl. 137.05.

In June 2013 the price of gasoline increased by Afl. 0.01 (0.4%) causing an effect of 0.03 ppts on the CPI. The price of diesel registered a decrease of Afl. 0.01 (-0.7%) and had an insignificant effect on the CPI of June 2013.

In June 2013, utilities, gasoline and diesel as a group show an increase in price of 0.1% compared to May 2013, and had an influence of 0.03 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining 448 goods and services, as a group, experienced an increase of 0.3% in price, causing an effect of 0.21 ppts on the CPI.

Change in prices of Food & catering services in June 2013

The "Food & catering services" index increased by 0.2% in June 2013, after decreasing in each of the three previous months. The index for "Food at home" shows an increase of 0.3% in June, as four of the eleven "Food at home" indices increased in June 2013. The "Fruit" index registered the largest increase (5.3%) in June and was mainly caused by increases of 8.7% and 4.0% in the indices for "Apples and pears" and "Other fruits and fruit products", respectively. The indices for "Vegetables", "Food products n.e.c." and "Meat" registered increases of 2.0%, 0.6% and 0.5%, respectively. The "Potatoes and other tubers" index decreased the most (-10.1%). The "Non-alcoholic beverages" index declined by 1.3%, the first since February 2012. Decreases of 1.0% and 0.8% were posted in the indices for "Milk, cheese and eggs" and "Fish and other seafood", respectively.

Over the last 12 months the "Food & catering services" index has increased by 0.6%. The "Food at home" index shows an increase of 0.4%. The "Fish and other seafood" index increased by 4.1%, the largest increase among the "Food at home" food groups, while the "Potatoes and other tubers" index shows the largest decrease (-12.6%).

The index for "Food away from home" shows a 0.1% increase in June, after increasing 0.3% in May 2013 and has increased by 1.2% over the last 12 months.

In June 2013, "Food at home" and "Food away from home" as a group show an increase in price of 0.2% compared to May 2013, and had an influence of 0.04 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining goods and services, as a group, experienced an increase in price of 0.2%, causing an effect of 0.19 ppts on the CPI.

The subsistence level in June 2013

The subsistence level is the minimum level of income which is perceived necessary to achieve an adequate standard of living in a given country. The subsistence level is usually determined by estimating the cost of all the essential resources that an average adult consumes in one month or year. This is commonly called a basic needs index, and varies according to the price of food, clothing, housing, transport and other items in the "basket". Equivalence scales are used to adjust for the assumed standard of living, of households of different sizes and composition. The scale assigns a weight of 1.0 for the first adult and 0.5 for each additional adult in the household (aged 15+) and a weight of 0.3 for each child (aged 0-14 years). The subsistence level is based on figures of the report "Bestaansminimum 2010" published by the CBS in November 2010 and is monthly updated for inflation using the monthly CPI. The reference unit used in this report is a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years).

In June 2013 the subsistence level for a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years) (Afl. 4,278) shows a decrease of Afl. 168 compared to June 2012 (Afl. 4,446) and was mainly caused by a decline of Afl. 158 in the "Housing" sector.
