#### **Special Remarks**

The population figures, presented, are based on two sources: -1. The population censuses that were held in 1981, 1991 and 2000 -2. The mutations in the population register, due to birth, death, marriage, divorce, domiciliation and departure.

At the bottom of each table, the source of the data is indicated.

The Population Censuses of 1981, 1991 and 2000 showed discrepancies with the population figures presented by the Registry Office. In both instances, there were more persons registered than counted during the Population Censuses. The discrepancies between the two sources are mainly due to underreporting of departure at the Population Registry Office. The Central Bureau of Statistics uses a statistical method to make corrections for the errors in the reported migration figures.

Individual figures in tables do not necessarily add up to totals, because of rounding. Currency figures are quoted in Aruban Florins (Afl.), unless otherwise stated. Revised figures are not marked as such.

**Period average** = an average of 12 months last business day. **End of period** = last business day of the year.

#### General Trade System (since year 2000)

*General Imports*: the combined total of imports both for direct domestic consumption and into bonded warehouses or Free Zones.

*General Exports*: the combined total of national exports and re-exports of nationalized goods.

**Re-exports**: the outward movement of nationalized goods plus goods that move outward in their unaltered state after having been imported from bonded warehouses or Free Zones.



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# **General characteristics of Aruba 2015**

Aruba is located at latitude 12° 30' North and longitude 70° West and lies about 32 km (19 miles) from the northern coast of Venezuela.

Aruba is 31 km (20 miles) long and 8 km (5 miles) wide, with an area of 180 km<sup>2</sup>. The island is divided in 8 regions and each region is subdivided in several zones.

The Aruban population is made up of a variety of nationalities.

Head of State is the King, represented by a Governor. The island is governed by an executive council consisting of 8 Ministers who are appointed by the legislative council. This council consists of 21 elected members of Parliament.

Aruba also has two Ministers Plenipotentiary abroad, one representing the island in the Council of Ministers of the Kingdom in The Hague and the second one in Washington. On January 1 1986, Aruba obtained its 'Status Aparte' and became a separate island state within the Kingdom of the Netherlands.

The key indicators concerning the Demographic aspects of 2015, show a total population of 110,108 persons. The calculated Sex ratio of 89.8 represents the number of males per 100 females.

The population density went from 602 persons per km<sup>2</sup> in 2014 (table 1.1 chapter 1) to 612 in 2015.

Stay-over passengers and Cruise passengers have both increased in numbers when compared to the 2014 numbers. This increasing trend can be viewed in chapter 8 (Tourism).

## **1.** Population

Population estimates are based on the population and housing census and on inter-Census data on births, deaths and migration, which are collected from the records of the Population Registry Office. Population growth in Aruba is highly dependent on migration, which poses a disadvantage when estimating the inter-Censal population. Specifically, persons country without who leave the deregistering pose a problem. Hence, the emigration rate that is presented could be lower than what it actually is. Therefore, after each Census, the Central Bureau of Statistics reviews the population estimates and makes adjustments for the number of migrants based on the new population count.





#### 1.2 The evolution of the population of Aruba, 1997 -2015






#### 1.4 Population density







#### 1.5 Total deaths and births 2015




#### 1.7 Births, deaths, immigration and emigration in Aruba, 2006 - 2015



1.11 Percentage live births by teenage mothers < 20 years and mothers 20 years and older, 2015











The number of beds in geriatric homes shows increase of 2.6% in 2015 after a drop of 8,2% in 2014 compared to 2013. Striking is the decrease of 33.5% of prospective clients on the waiting list for admission to the geriatric homes.

For both males and females the most prevalent causes of death are still neoplasms (20%) and diseases of the circulatory system (42%). The population in the age group 65 years and older for both sexes account for most of these deaths.






2.6 Inhabitants per Physicians/specialists and inhabitants per dentists/orthodontists, 2014, 2015

#### 2.7 Causes of death, males, in %, 2014





#### Most prevalent causes of deaths female 2015










#### Number of students, Secondary level September 2014

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





#### 5.14 Population<sup>1</sup> by level of education obtained by age category in percentages





## 6. Labor

Labor statistics are gathered via Population and Housing Censuses (every 10 years) and via dedicated surveys.

In this chapter, statistics gathered via two consecutive Censuses are presented. The data shows that in ten years' time (between 2000 and 2010) there was a drop in the labor participation rate of males (from 72.5 in 2000 to 63.9 in 2010).

In addition, a drop was seen in the employment rate of males (from 67.8 in 2000 to 61.5 in 2010). The unemployment decreased for both males and females in the same period of time, and stood in 2010 at 10.6.








## Total number of Unemployed by sex, 2010


#### 6.6 Persons employed by the government by ministries<sup>1</sup>, December 31,2014 and 2015


The number of companies registered with the Social Security Bank (and thus employ one or more employees) as per the end of the year increased from 2,882 in 2014 to 2,969 in 2015. Geographically, the largest reduction was registered in San Nicolas South (9 companies) and the largest increase in the number of companies was registered in Oranjestad West (27).

The number of registered employees (which excludes Government and non-private schools' employees) amounted to 42,702 as per the end of 2015, of which 46% were employed directly by the industries Hotels & Restaurants and Wholesale & Retail Trade. The Real Estate, Renting, and Business Activity industry employed 17% of employees. This latter mentioned industry includes temporary manpower companies, of which the employees are active in several of the other industries.



#### **Regional distribution of registered companies 2015**




7.4 Relative growth of registered companies by region, 2014 - 2015



### 8. Tourism

Tourism movements are increasingly of interest as economic, social and cultural events, which annually and on a country basis make one destination more popular than the other also in income and wealth. The travel and tourism industry is the economic lifeblood of many countries, especially islands around the world. This is also the case for the Caribbean hence also Aruba. 





## Frequency of visits to Aruba (in %), 2014









### 9. Traffic

In 2015 a total of 1,064 additional ships docked in the ports of Aruba, which translated in an increase in pilotage dues of Afl.175.000 compared to 2014.

The commercial landings of aircrafts also saw an increase of 21%. In 2015 the number of travelers passing through the Reina Beatrix Airport of Aruba increased significantly from 2.3 million to 2.9 million passengers compared to 2013.

In comparison to 2014 the percentage of motor vehicles that did not pass the inspection test went from 17.6% to 23.7% in 2015.

### 10. Trade

Foreign Trade Statistics contains information on Imports to Aruba, Imports to the Free Zone Aruba, Exports from Aruba and Exports from the Free Zone Aruba. The CBS processes the Foreign Trade data according to the General Trade System. The Customs administration collects data through a computerized customs management system (ASYCUDA), which takes into account the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (HS). The HS is able to provide data at most detailed level, enabling international comparability of trade statistics and facilitating detailed analysis international trade. The system handles manifests and customs declarations, accounting procedures, and warehousing manifest and suspense procedures. Approximately 10.000 documents are registered on a monthly





### 11. Money

Broad money, which is a broad indicator for the value of money in Aruba, increased from Afl. 3,461.0 million at the end of 2014 to Afl. 3,796.2 million at the end of 2015 as a consequence of the increase of the net foreign assets with Afl. 342.7 million from Afl. 1,172.9 million at the end of 2014 to Afl. 1,515.6 million at the end of 2015.

In total as per the end of 2015, respectively Afl. 981.3 million and Afl. 806.5 million were held in saving and time deposits with the commercial banks.

The period average conversion rate of the Euro for Afl. 1 decreased from 2.39 per end 2014 to 2.00 per end 2015.








### **12.** Macro-economic aspects

The Gross Domestic Product, which gives the monetary value of goods and services produced in Aruba, as estimated by the Central Bank of Aruba amounted to Afl. 4,836 million in 2015. The nominal GDP per capita was AFL. 44,269, which increased by 0.7% compared to 2014.

Measured for the year 2014, the size of the GDP per capita of Aruba was 45% compared to that of the USA and 47% compared to that of the Netherlands.

Benchmarked against Trinidad & Tobago, Bahamas, and Barbados, the size of the GDP per capita of Aruba was respectively 18.6%, 6.0%, and 60.0% higher.





### 13. Finance

Based on the financial statements of the Government of Aruba (Land Aruba), total government revenues increased from Afl. 1,143,980 million in 2014 to Afl. 1,201,997 million in 2015.

Tax revenues on Income and Profit (wage tax, income tax, profit tax, tax on dividends) constituted 40.7% of total Government revenues.

Tax revenues on Commodities (import duties and excises on spirits, beer, gasoline, tobacco) contributed with 23.7% to total Government revenues.

Proceeds from Taxes on Properties declined due to less proceeds from Land Tax and Motor Vehicle Tax.

#### 14.2 Period average inflation, 2006-2015



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

According to the 2015 data, the subsistence level basis for a household of two adults and two children went from Afl. 4,313 in 2014 to Afl. 4,384.







# 16. Housing

Data concerning the characteristics of housing of the persons living in Aruba was collected during the Fifth Population and Housing Census, which was held in 2010.

According to last Census the total number of housing unit was registered at 34,845. The 2000 Census registered nearly 5,600 less housing units.

The region of Noord/Tanki Leendert remains the region with the highest growth in population (27.2%) as well as in housing units (36.7%) compared to the 2000 Census.

Meanwhile the region of San Nicolas South was the only region where a decrease was registered in both the number of housing units (7.8%) and the total population (12.5%).





# **17.** Climate

The average temperature in Aruba has remained stable over the years and was registered at 28.6 degrees centigrade in 2015.

The same can not be said about the average precipitation during the last 5 years. The total precipitation went from 826 mm in 2011 to 134 mm in 2015, which translates back to a 83.8% decrease in rainfall.




