

**Press Release Consumer Price Index May 2013** 

### Consumer Price Index, base period December 2006 May 2013

The Central Bureau of Statistics presents the most important findings for the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the month of May 2013.

The CPI for May 2013 is 117.17, a decrease of 0.4% compared to the index of April 2013 (117.61) and accumulating an increase of 0.3% up to and including May of this year.

The percentage change of the CPI over the last 12 months (May 2012 to May 2013) is -3.8, a decrease of 5.2 percentage points (ppts) compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (1.4).

The period average percentage change of the CPI for the period May 2012 - May 2013 is -2.5, a decrease of 7.7 ppts compared to the period average percentage change over the period May 2011 - May 2012 (5.2).

During this month, seven of the twelve sectors registered decreases in prices. The decreases which had the greatest influence on the CPI were registered for the "Transport" sector (-1.5%), "Health" sector (-2.4%) and the "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" (-0.3%), causing an effect of respectively -0.28, -0.05 and -0.04 ppts. The decreases in the remaining sectors had a total effect of -0.06 ppts on the CPI of May 2013.

Aforementioned decreases were partially offset mainly by an increase in the index for the "Recreation and culture" sector (0.3%), which had an influence of 0.03 ppts. The increases in the remaining sectors had a total effect of 0.02 ppts on the CPI of May 2013.


The decrease in the "Transport" sector was due to decreases in the categories "Operation of personal transport equipment" (-2.5%) and "Transport services" (-5.4%), which contributed to an effect of -0.25 ppts and -0.07 ppts, respectively. The decrease in the "Health" sector was mainly caused by a decrease in the category "Medical products, appliances and equipment" (-3.7%), causing an effect of -0.05 ppts. The decrease in the "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" sector was caused by a decrease in the category "Food" (-0.4%), which contributed to an effect of -0.05 ppts.

The increase in the "Recreation and culture" sector was mainly caused by an increase of 2.7% in the category "Holidays", which contributed to an effect of 0.02 ppts.

The consumption basket of the CPI consists of 452 goods and services. Compared to April 2013, 35.2% of these products had an increase in price, causing an effect of 0.37 ppts, while 34.3% showed a decrease, contributing to an effect of -0.75 ppts and the remaining 30.5% had no change in price. The prices of goods decreased by 0.5% and caused an influence of -0.35 ppts. The prices of services show a decrease of 0.1% and had an influence of -0.03 ppts.

The CPIC (core inflation) - CPI excluding the effect of energy and food - registered in May 2013 a decrease of 0.3%, which is 2.3 ppts lower compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (2.0%). The energy index - which consists of the products: electricity, water, gasoline and diesel - registered a decrease of 10.3%, which is 25.6 ppts lower compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (15.3%). The food index shows an increase of 0.5%, which is 5.0 ppts lower compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (5.5%).

The subsistence level for a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years) in May 2013 is Afl. 4,269, a decrease of Afl. 182, compared to May 2012 (Afl. 4,451), while for a single adult household the amount is Afl. 2,033, a decrease of Afl. 87, compared to May 2012 (Afl. 2,120).

## Change in prices of crude oil, utilities, gasoline and diesel in May 2013

The prices of utilities (electricity and water), gasoline and diesel are for the greater part determined by international crude oil prices. In May 2013 the average price per barrel of crude oil (US\$ 94.39) had an increase of US\$ 2.53 (2.8%) compared to April 2013 (US\$ 91.86).

Fuel surcharge for a usage of electricity up to 500 kWh did not change in May 2013, it stayed at Afl. 24.60 cents per kWh. Fuel surcharge for a usage of electricity between 501 -1000 kWh did not change in May 2013, it stayed at Afl. 30.90 cents per kWh. The prices of electricity and water did not change compared to April 2013. Subsequently, the average electricity price per household remained at Afl. 306.75, while the average price of water per household remained at Afl. 137.05.

In May 2013 the price of gasoline decreased by Afl. 0.08 (-3.4%) causing an effect of -0.23 ppts on the CPI. The price of diesel registered a decrease of Afl. 0.07 (-3.5%) and had an effect of -0.01 ppt on the CPI of May 2013.

In May 2013, utilities, gasoline and diesel as a group show a decrease in price of 1.2% compared to April 2013, and had an influence of -0.25 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining 448 goods and services, as a group, experienced a decrease of 0.2% in price, causing an effect of -0.13 ppts on the CPI.

# Change in prices of Food & catering services in May 2013

The "Food & catering services" index decreased by 0.1% in May 2013, the same as in April 2013. The index for "Food at home" shows a decrease of 0.3% in May, as six of the eleven "Food at home" indices decreased in May 2013. The "Vegetables" index registered the largest decrease (-3.8%) in May and was mainly caused by decreases of 10.9% and 16.2% in the indices for "Onions" and "Lettuce", respectively. The "Fruit" index declined by 2.1% and the index for "Fish and other seafood" shows a decrease of 0.6%, the first decline since November 2012. The "Potatoes and other tubers" index increased the most (0.9%), followed by increases of 0.6%, 0.5% and 0.5% in the indices for "Non-alcoholic beverages", "Meat" and "Milk, cheese and eggs", respectively.

Over the last 12 months the "Food & catering services" index has increased by 0.4%. The "Food at home" index shows an increase of 0.3%. The "Fish and other seafood" index increased by 5.1%, the largest increase among the "Food at home" food groups, while the "Fruit" index shows the largest decrease (-6.8%).

The index for "Food away from home" shows a 0.3% increase in May, the same increase as in April 2013 and has increased by 0.9% over the last 12 months.

In May 2013, "Food at home" and "Food away from home" as a group show a decrease in price of 0.1% compared to April 2013, and had an influence of -0.02 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining goods and services, as a group, experienced a decrease in price of 0.4%, causing an effect of -0.35 ppts on the CPI
