

PREFACE

In a developing society not only the demographic and social characteristics of the households change over time, but the conditions and levels of living of these households change too as do the differences in the consumption patterns of different population groups.

The Income and Expenditure Survey is an essential source of information for determining the social needs, establishing targets for development planning and assess the impact these policies have on households.

With the Income and Expenditure Survey not only an accurate insight is given on the expenditures of the households, but it also determines the actual needs of the population. It is an important source of information for the national accounts system and is the basic tool to monitor the price developments, in order to calculate the monthly consumer price index.

Ever since the last Income and Expenditure Survey held in 1993, a lot has changed. There are new products on the market (cellular phones, DVD-recorders, etc.), other kind of food (different bread varieties, microwave products, other beer brands, etc.), some products are not sold anymore, people's preferences change, etc.. The Income and Expenditure Survey 1998 compares the actual condition of the Aruban households with the condition back in 1993.

The purpose of this first edition on the results of the Income and Expenditure Survey 1998 is to supply the users with complete and detailed tables of the expenditures made by households by specific sectors and products.

The successful course of the Income and Expenditure Survey 1998 is thanks to the Budget team consisting of the CBS staff, the team of interviewers and the data-entry typists. A word of appreciation goes to the Water and Energy Company (WEB N.V.), who assisted us with the surveyed population.

PURPOSE & METHODOLOGY

PURPOSE

The main purpose of the income and Expenditure Survey is to determine the pattern of consumption of the residents in Aruba. From this pattern of consumption one can obtain weights and other useful data for the revision of the consumer price indices designed to measure changes in consumer prices over time. The purpose of a consumer price index is to measure changes over time in the general level of prices of goods and services that a reference population use, acquire or purchase for consumption.

Some other objectives are:

- to supply basic data for the social and economic planning and for the determination of related needs and targets
- to assess the impact of economic and social measures on the living conditions of households and the structure of household consumption
- to supplement the data used in household accounts in the System of National Accounts
- to provide data on the distribution of household income and expenditure for the different product brands
- to provide information on particular aspects of living conditions such as food consumption, housing and health

METHODOLOGY

In the Income and Expenditure Survey two kind of techniques were used in order to give a better insight in the household expenditure pattern. The household books were used to cover a short observation period and on the other hand the retrospective questionnaires gathered information over a long period of time.

A participating household made notes in the household book, during a period of 14 days, of all the expenditures made by all the members of the household. The household recorded for what kind of product or service a certain expense was made, what it was (the brandname, quantity description), the number and unit bought and the name of the business where the purchase was made.

Only expenditures made during the 14-day observation period were entered in the household book. Other (often sporadically occuring) expenses made during the course of the year could not be entered in such a way (like vacation expenses, mortgage, house rent, telephone costs, water and energy costs). By using the retrospective questionnaire information on these kind of expenses could be gathered. The questionnaire referred to a period prior to the survey period. The reference period varied somewhat since some products and services are more often consumed than others are. Durable goods like cars, ovens and refrigerators, are such goods that are occasionally purchased, making it inevitable to ask the amount on expenditures made during the year before the survey period. Besides questions in the retrospective questionnaire about goods purchased, information was gathered on social, economic and demographic characteristics of the households. It is essential to to get insight into the household income. Therefore a special form was added to the retrospective questionnaire which had to be filled in by all members of the household.

In form 1 general questions were asked about the household composition. Forms 2 through 9 comprise questions about occasional purchases, while form 10 deals with different kinds of income sources of each member of the household. A copy of the retrospective questionnaire and a page of the household book are included in appendix 1. The reader should keep in mind that due to small sample variablity, the expenditures made for the sector 'Health', may not be representing the current expenses on health. In order to gather accurate numbers about health expenses, a much larger sample size has to be drawn. Meaning that the Income and Expenditure Survey is not the best way to collect the expenditures made by the households on health.

FIELDWORK & NON-RESPONSE

FIELDWORK

An Income and Expenditure Survey, unlike other surveys, demands a lot of the respondents' time and effort. As mentioned before all expenditures made by the household during the 14-day observation period had to be entered in the household book and a retrospective questionnare had to be filled in. Therefore respondents had to be constantly monitored and encouraged to continue with the survey. On the other hand it puts also a great deal of pressure on the interviewers. During the months of October 1998 through January 1999 a total of 799 households were visited by a team of 20 interviewers. The participants had to be intensively guided in order to avoid early dropout of households. Unfortunately one cannot avoid cases such as refusals, uninhabited houses, addresses not found or missed households. There is also a group of respondents who agreed to the survey, but called it off before the end of period. The non-response in this year's survey compared to the Income and Expenditure Survey in 1993 is given in detail in the next paragraph.

NON-RESPONSE

The non-responses are visited households which were not successful at the completion of the survey. There are three kinds of non-response. First there are those households who have refused to cooperate. Then there are the ones who agreed from the beginning to participate but have stopped afterwards. Finally, there are households that could not be reached. The information registered on the household card was used to analyze the non response.

The total non-response for the household expenditure survey was 38 percent of all visited households. Most part of the non-response consisted of flat out refusals. Reasons vary from lack of understanding the importance of such a survey, time consuming, seeing no personal gain to a possible breach of their privacy. A group of about 37 households did agree to participate in the beginning but did not complete the survey. Beside refusals, failing to reach a household is also considered as non-response. Reasons for not reaching a household were not being able to find anyone home at the moment of visit, address uninhabited or unable to locate an assigned address. Other reasons were noted under the category 'other'.

In comparison to the non-response of the 1993 the overall percentage of non-response dropped from 43 to 38 percent. It is to be mentioned that the surveyors were given instructions to try to explain to the selected households in a simple manner the importance of the survey and their participation in it. The type and quantity of non-response tended to vary from each surveyor and each region. To put it simply, one can consider the households that refused or started but did not finish as true non-response. They were a total of 143 households, translating in a non-response percentage of 17.90%.

The following is a table containing all categories comparing the non-response of 1993 and 1998.

The average personal income increased with 14.2 percent since 1993

Compared to the third Population and Housing Census 1991, the monthly personal income has increased in all levels of the Aruban community. Table A. and graph A. show the growth in the monthly personal income over the last 7 years. Since the last Census in 1991, the salary of the the lowest income group increased with a much higher percentage then that of the highest income group, respectively 194 percent and 41 percent. Notwithstanding the preceding findings, graph A. shows that the gap between the highest income and the lowest income is getting even bigger.

Graph A. Personal income in percentiles



A remarkable growth of income from salary in the Noord/Tanki Leendert region

Table 3 and table 4. show the distribution of personal income by region for the years 1993 and 1998. They also distinguish persons with a job from those who are jobless, and describe their personal income. According to these tables, the average gross monthly income obtained from salary increased, as well as income from other sources and the total average income for persons with a job. Personal income obtained from salary in the region "Noord/Tanki Leendert" increased with more than 16 percent. On the other hand, the regions "Oranjestad" and "Savaneta" display a decrease in income obtained from salary. Jobless persons took also advantage of the economic growth during the last years. Since household income and household size are closely interrelated, table 5 provide both the average size of the household and the average and median household income. In the past 5 years, the average householdsize dropped from 3.5 to 3.17 persons per household. With less persons working in a household, one can expect a minor decrease in householdincome.

A one person household spends proportionally twice as much as a 4 personhousehold

Changes in consumer and household spending patterns reflect changes in the economy and in individual and social behaviour. Among the factors influencing spending patterns are changes in prices, incomes, consumer preferences, the types of goods and services available, and household and family structures. Since 1993 consumer expenditure has generally been increasing. In this survey, expenditure is grouped into nine broad categories: food, beverages and tobacco products, apparel, housing, household-operation, health, transport and communication, leisure and recreational goods and goods and services not else classified.

Table 6 and graph C show an increase in expenditures for different types of households. A one person household has changed its priorities since the last held Income and Expenditure Survey in 1993. Like in 1993, the sector Housing is still the sector on which a person spends more than a third of its expenditures. The second largest expenditure group in 1998 was goods and services n.e.c., accounting for 20.1 percent of household expenditure. This sector includes among others financial services and money transfers. The rapid growth of this sector confirms the results of the Labor Force Survey 1997, which indicated that on average a monthly amount of Afl. 264,= was spend on remmitances per person. Expenditures on food and transport and communication accounts for 9.42 and 9.36 respectively). Spending on apparel (7.9 percent), household operation (6.5 percent), leisure and recreational goods (5.8 percent), beverages and tobacco products (1.6) and health (0.3) percent, made up the remainder of household expenditure in 1998.

(In order to measure expenditures on health accurate, a sample size of at least one third of Aruba's population has to be taken. For obvious reasons this is beyond the possibilities, which means that expenditures made for the sector health, may not be representing the current expenses on health).

Graph C. Household expenditures by household size





Table 6 descibe the differences between households consisting of one person, and all the other households. Main differences between the two types of households concern expenditures on goods and services n.e.c., housing and transport and communication. Households consisting of one person, transfer more money to foreign countries than the other households, which explains the high percentage to the sector goods and services n.e.c. Percentage wise one person-households spend more on housing. It seems that for furnishing less money is left. The same is applicable for transportation and communication.

Households with less income spend more than 50 percent of expenditures on housing and food

When we arrange households according to household income, it can be concluded that the whole community has been spending considerably more since 1993, especially the households with less income. Their expenditures grew by 67 percent comparing 1998 with 1993. On average, households have been spending 8.2 percent more in 1998 compared to 1993.


Remarkable is the shifting of priorities in all levels of the community. The sector housing has continued to make up the largest proportion of household expenditure. The indigent groups (25 th percentile) spend proportionally more on housing than the more affluent households. In 1993 food was considered to be the second major expense for the group belonging to the 25th percentile, followed by transport & communication in the third place, apparel fourth and household operation fifth. In 1998 however food expenses moved to be on the third place, while transport & communication moved to the second place, followed by other goods & services n.e.c. (including insurance and financial services). Comparing the lowest and the highest percentile, remarkably, one can observe the same priorities in spending, although percentage wise the group with more income spends more on relative luxery goods, as Leisure and recreational goods and household operation.

Table A.1. compares expenditures (per month, yearly and per 10000) per household for 1993 and 1998. The expenditure pattern shows several changes over the years. Households spend percentage wise a lot more on the sectors Goods and Services not else classified (n.e.c.), Transport and Communication and Housing. The sector goods and Services n.e.c. shows a relative growth of 49 percent when comparing 1998 with 1993. This sector consists of the categories Toiletries and cosmetics, Insurance services, Other goods and services and unknown articles or n.e.c. In the 1998 Income and Expenditure Survey a new category was added to this sector called Money transfers. The expenses recorded for this new category gives partially an explanation for the increase. Another more remarkable reason is that households spend more in 1998 on Insurance services, especially Insurance on damage n.e.c..

In this table the households are classified according to the median household income. The median is any value that evenly divides the distribution. With a median monthly household income of Afl. 3,175 per month, 50 percent of the households earn an income below this value, and 50 percent earn a household income above this value. Since 1993, the median household income increased from Afl. 3,063 per month to Afl.3,175 per month by the end of 1998.

The expenditures made by the households clearly show little differences in priorities of the low and high income classes. The low income class households spend the majority of their expenditures on the sectors 'Housing', 'Transport and Communication', 'Goods and Services n.e.c.', in that particular order. The high income class households on the other hand spend the majority of their expenditures on the sectors 'Housing', 'Transport and Communication', 'Goods and Services n.e.c.' and 'Food'. The low income class households spend proportionally more on basic goods, such as housing, food and beverages.

When comparing the relative growth of expenditures per person with the relative growth of expenditures per household, one may observe a different trend. The sector 'Housing' is a good example. The results show an increase of almost 30 percent in this sector since the last held Income and expenditure Survey in 1993, when considering expenditures per household. When analyzing the expenditures made per person, an increase of 43 percent is shown. The sector 'Leisure and recreational goods' on the other hand show a 5.1 percent decrease per household, while the expenditures per person show an increase of 4.8 percent. This is caused by the changes in householdsize. The average household size dropped from 3.5 persons per household in 1993 to 3.2 persons per household in 1998. This development explans the decrease in household expenditures on one hand, and the increase of expenditures per person on the other hand.

Comparison of household expenditure data in real or constant florin terms make use of the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Real expenditures takes accounts of different relative price changes by deflating nominal expenditure - i.e. removing the effects of inflation - and expressing expenditure in florin of a particular point in time. Relative price movement differences can sometimes be the reason why housholds spending pattern change over time; other reasons include changes in supply or demand such as greater product diversity or changing consumer tastes.

Table D. is, in constrast with table C., corrected for inflation, and provides the relative growth of the sectors. According to table C. households spend less in the sector 'Food' (12%) and in table D. this same sector shows a drop of 26 percent. In other words, the decrease in the sector 'Food' in table C. gives a comparison of the expenditures in 1993 and 1998 after correction for inflation. The households have spend in 1993 a total of Afls.5,878 on food and in 1998 Afls.5,159. Table D. compares the expenses made in 1993 with the expenses made in 1998, corrected for inflation. Thus the amount of Afls.5,159 spend in 1998 on food, has a real value of Afls.4,330. The amount is corrected for inflation in order to make a fair comparison between 1993 and 1998. This means that if no inflation has occured during these five years, the expenses on the sector 'Food' would have been Afls.4,330.

Tables A.1. and others show dramatic changes in the expenditure pattern of households. When taking into consideration the inflation during the last five years, the changes are even more dramatic. The sector 'Clothing and footwear', for example, shows the impact of the inflation (40%) on the amount spend in this sector. It may seem that the expenditures in this sector only dropped with 8 percent, while correcting for inflation, this sector has known a real drop of 35 percent.

As per table C., the sectors 'Housing', 'Transport and communication' and 'Goods and services n.e.c.' show a fast growth, while in table D., corrected for inflation, this growth is much less. The sector 'Housing', for example, shows a growth according to table C. of 30 percent, while in reality the growth is only 13 percent.

Table D.1. and E.1. show the relative growth of expenditures between 1993 and 1998 corrected for inflation. We noticed already in table D. that household expenditures patterns changed considerably when taking inflation into account. Table E. take inflation as well as householdsize into account. This means that, eventhough table C. might show a decrease of only 3 percent for the sector 'Food', when correcting for inflation and householdsize the decrease in this sector is equivalent to 18.7 percent. Consequently, the average person spends almost 19 percentless on "Food". The sector 'Clothing and footwear' shows an increase of 1 percent per person according to the results of the survey. When taking the inflation into consideration, the expenses made for this sector dropped with 28 percent. Remarkable is the fact that the total yearly expenditures per person increased with 17 percent from 1993 to 1998. But when correcting for inflation, the increase is negligible.

The results shown in the previous tables give an overall view of the fluctuations in the expenditures made by the households. In tables F. and F.1. however, we can observe the influence the household size has on the expenditures made by the different kind of households. A one-person household and large households (5 persons or more) do not have the same expenditure pattern as the more frequently observed households (2-4 persons per household).

Table F.1. gives an aggregated view of the expenditures made by households categorised by size of household. It is interesting to analyse the expenditures on a detailed basis in order to have a better insight in the expenditure pattern of the different household types.

In table F.1., for example, one can observe that a one-person household spends relatively more than other household types on 'Goods and services n.e.c.'. But according to table B., one can observe that a one-person household spends relatively more than other household types on 'Money transfers', 'Insurance against damage n.e.c.', 'Wage domestic help', 'Property rent' and 'Cigarettes and cigars'.

It is interesting to note that a one-person household spends relatively as much as a 'large' household on 'Snacks and Take-aways'. Households with less than 5 persons spend more on 'Strong alcoholic beverages' compared to a household with more than 5 persons, which spend more on 'Lemonade powder'.

CONCEPTS & DEFINITIONS

CONSUMPTION

The activitity of consumption consists of the non-productive use of goods and services for the satisfaction of individual or collective human needs or wants. In this survey consumption is recorded on acquisition basis. The acquisitions variant of the expenditure approach defines expenditures as the value of the goods and services which households purchase at the time those goods or services are actually acquired. The timing of the actual money payments or when the commodity is consumed is of no relevance.

Consumption expenditure of households covers:

- a. Purchases of goods and services;
- b. Goods and services received as income in kind;
- c. produce on own account, including the imputed values of the housing services from owner-occupied dwellings. (*The housing services produced are deemed to be equal in value to the rentals that would be paid on the market for accommodation of the same size, quality and type.*)

The following outlays are excluded from the consumption expenditure:

- a. Direct taxes;
- b. Pension fund contributions and social security;
- c. Interests paid;
- d. Current transfers received;
- e. Investments, including improvements and expansions of own residence;
- f. Extended loans.

HEAD OF HOUSEHOLD

The head of the household is the member of the household who is either:

- The legal owner of the housing unit, or
- The person responsible for paying the rent.

Where no, (or more than one) head in one housing unit can be determined, the oldest among all candidates is assigned as the head of the household. This occurs, for instance, in combined ownership and rent-free housing units.

The head of the household is most commonly used as the refernce person to whom the relationship of all other household members is established.

HOUSEHOLD

A household may either be:

- a. A one-person household, i.e., a person who provides his or her own food or other basic essentials, without teaming up with any other person to form part of a multiperson household or
- b. A multi-person household, i.e., a group of two or more persons living together which makes common provision for food or other essentials for living.

A criterion, to determine whether persons belong to the same household is to detect whether these persons use a common room. Another important indicator is that the persons share their meals. In this respect, we must note that for example a live-in housemaid sometimes belongs to the household in which she works and sometimes does not belong to it. It all depends on whether or not the housemaid has her own quarters where she lives, separately and almost independently, after her daily work.

Examples of households:

- A person living alone (a one-person household)
- A father or mother with some children (man/ woman with children)
- A family consisting of a father, a mother and some children (married couple with/ without child(ren))
- A man and a woman living together and some children (not married couple with/ without child(ren))
- A man and a woman with their child(ren) living together with the parents of the woman, they are all related to each other (extended family)
- A man and a woman with their child(ren) living together with the parents of the woman and at least one unattached person (a live-in maid), (composite household)

HOUSEHOLD TYPE

This classification is based on family groups. In this Income and expenditure survey a household type may be:

- A one-person household
- A married couple with no child(ren)
- A married couple with child(ren)
- An extended household
- A composite household
- A not married couple with no child(ren)
- A not married couple with child(ren)
- A man or woman with child(ren)

The following household types may also be referred to as a nuclear household (a household consisting entirely of a single conjugal family nucleus):

- A married couple with no child(ren)
- A married couple with child(ren)
- A man or woman with child(ren)

An extended household consists of persons related to each other, but not comprising a nuclear household. An extended household is further subdivided into the following categories:

- One conjugal family nuclei and at least one unattached person, all related to each other
- Two or more conjugal family nuclei and at least one unattached person, all related to each other
- Two or more conjugal family nuclei, related to each other, without any other persons
- Two or more persons related to each other, but none of them forms part of a conjugal family nucleus

A composite household consists of persons not all related to each other. A composite household is further subdivided into the following categories:

- One conjugal family nucleus and at least one unattached person, not related to the conjugal family nucleus
- Two or more conjugal family nuclei and at least one unattached person
- Two or more conjugal family nuclei, without unattached persons
- Two or more unattached persons, without any family relations

INCOME

The Income and Expenditure Survey only covers the gross income. Gross income is the total income before deductions of own contributions and additions on employer's social contributions. In other words, the net disposable income is the gross income minus the contributions to social security and minus the deductions of income taxes. We distinguish the following three forms of income:

- a. Wages and salaries and employer's contribution to social security. Gross entrepreneurial income of own enterprise, including consumtion of own produce and income of members from producers' co-operatives;
- b. Income from investments and stocks (capital) interests, rents of owner-occupied dwellings, dividends and rent, including royalties, patents, copyrights and the like.
- c. Current transfer received and other receipts such as social security benefits, pension and life insuarnce annuity benefits and other current transfers received.

The total household income is the sum of a + b + c of all members of the household. In addition to income we have to do with certain receipts, which are <u>not</u> included in the income:

- a. Property income;
- b. Received loans (net) and repayments;
- c. Received current transfers:
- d. casualty insurance claims (no life insurance annuity benefits); payments of inheritance taxes and of capital donations to non-profit bodies.
