

## Population figures CBS versus DBSB: why the discrepancy

Accurate, reliable and regular data on population size and basic population characteristics are essential for a country's well-functioning. Not only for general government purposes, but also to be used for well-planned decision making by governmental and non-governmental organizations, such as for the allocation of health services, utility services, and retail establishments and for the creation of time series statistics such as per capita income, births per capita and incidence rates of certain illnesses among other things.



Population change depends on three components: births, deaths and migration. In Aruba, population growth is highly dependent on migration. However an under-registration in migration events, mainly the number of emigrants, poses a disadvantage whether it is in estimating the intercensal population or keeping the population registry up-to-date.

As of the end of June 2015, the Central Bureau of Statistics (CBS) estimated, in accordance with international standards, a total of 109,028 persons to be living on Aruba, while at the Population and Civil Registry Office (DBSB) a total of 117,657 persons were registered (table 1). The discrepancy of 8,629 persons between the estimated population by the CBS and the registered population is mainly attributed to poor compliance of individuals with regards to the registration of their arrival in Aruba and their departure to another country.

In addition, children born in Aruba to parents with a nationality other than the Dutch nationality, are registered in the Population Registry only after they are granted a residence permit<sup>1</sup>. The birth certificates of these children are drawn up, but are kept merely as a civil registration. This explains the lower number of children of ages 0-4 years in the Population Registry compared to the CBS estimates (table 1).

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The base for the population estimates by the CBS is the Population and Housing count (or popularly called 'Censo' or 'Census') and the registered population at the DBSB (also

popularly called 'Censo') which is the actual officially registered number of persons in the official registry according to the National Decree on Population Registry. These are two different systems used for different purposes.

The census is held by the CBS and provides the demographic snapshot of a population at a given time and collects information on a wide range of issues. The Population Registry on the other hand is kept up-to-date by the DBSB and gives a picture of the population on specific information at any point in time.

The intercensal population estimates by the CBS are adjusted according to international guidelines by adjusting the number of emigrants based on the new population count during the intercensal years and the number of delayed birth recordings<sup>2</sup>.

Contrary to the census, the Population Registry is characterized by the continuous, permanent, compulsory and universal nature of the registration of its records. Registration in the Population Registry is a major and critical element for establishing the essential rights and privileges of individuals in a population<sup>3</sup>. In spite of the compulsory nature of the registry, the cases of non-compliance affects the completeness of the registry and the mandate of the DBSB to keep the registry up-to-date.

The role of the census, other than providing a snapshot of the population at a given time, is to serve as a complementary source to the Population Registry<sup>4</sup>. Censuses need to be used to evaluate and enrich civil registration data3 and vice versa.

An up-to-date registry is key to reliable and timely information to other government agencies, such as the CBS, the AZV, the health department, electoral services and the general public.
