CHILDREN BORN IN ARUBA

During the first three quarters of 2015, a total of 753 children were born in Aruba. This is about 27 percent less than during the same period in 2014 when 1,027 children were born. However, this total of 753 children does not include the not yet registered children born in Aruba, given that they are awaiting their residence permit¹. Additionally, yearly totals may still vary as during the last five years, on average, relatively more children were born during the last quarter, except in 2014 where slightly more children were born during the second quarter of the year.

Graph 1 shows a significant social development during the last decades. In 1992, 36.8 percent of all children were born out of wedlock compared to 44.4 percent in 2000. According to the figures from the Population Registry Office this percentage has

Graph1. Proportion of children born out of wedlock 1992-2014



increased to 60.4 percent of all births in 2010 and to 65.8 percent in 2014, reaching its highest peak in 2012 at 68.0 percent of all births.

The proportion of children born out of wedlock is highest among the youngest age-groups, specifically teenagers.

However, the number of children born to teenage mothers is considerably smaller than children born to older mothers. The largest number of children is born to mothers between the ages of 20-34 years, of which 65.4 percent is born out of wedlock. Additionally, the proportion of births out of wedlock are higher among mothers born in Aruba or the Netherlands Antilles². In 2014, of the children born to women who were born in Aruba or the Netherlands Antilles, 76.1 percent were out of wedlock, compared to 51 percent of those born to foreign-born women.

Graph2. Proportion of persons registering by specific country of birth



NEW REGISTRATIONS

The number of persons registered in 2011 was 3,466 persons, followed by 3,283 in 2012 and 3,335 in 2013. The year 2014 showed a 20 percent decrease in the number of persons registered at the Population Registry Office. However, during the first three quarters of 2015, a total of 2,704 persons registered at the Population Registry Office, which is about 25 percent more than during the same period in 2014 when 2,158 registered. This is mainly caused by a 38.2 percent increase of foreign-born persons who registered during 2015. The largest group was from the Netherlands, following the trend of the last 10 years, with exception of 2011 when more persons born in Colombia were registered. Notwithstanding their larger number, the share of those from the Netherlands has shown a 14 percent decrease during these last 10 years. On the other hand, people from China (631%), Jamaica (386%), Haiti (150%), Philippines (144%), and the Dominican Republic (136%) have the highest percentage growth in the number of registered persons.
