

## Consumer Price Index, base period June 2019

### June 2023

The Central Bureau of Statistics presents the most important findings for the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the month of June 2023.




### Consumer Price Index for the month of June 2023

The CPI for June 2023 is 106.20, a decrease of 0.4% compared to the index of May 2023 (106.60).

The percentage change of the CPI over the last twelve (12) months (June 2022 to June 2023) is 2.8, a decrease of 2.5 percentage points (ppts) compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (5.3%).

The period average (last 24 months) percentage change of the CPI for the periods June 2021 to June 2022 and June 2022 to June 2023 is 5.9%, an increase of 2.5 ppts compared to the period average percentage change over the periods June 2020 to June 2021 and June 2021 to June 2022 (3.4%).



During this month, five (5) of the twelve (12) sectors registered decreases in prices. The decreases that had the greatest influence on the CPI were registered for the “Recreation and culture” (-2.3%) and “Transport” (-1.2%) sectors, which contributed with an effect of -0.22 and -0.17 ppts, respectively. The decreases in the remaining sectors had an effect of -0.20 ppts on the CPI of June 2023.


Aforementioned decreases were partially offset mainly by increases in the indices for the “Housing” (0.4%) and “Miscellaneous goods and services” (0.4%) sectors, which caused an effect of 0.09 and 0.05 ppts, respectively. The increases in the remaining sectors had an effect of 0.06 ppts on the CPI of June 2023.

The decrease in the “Recreation and culture” sector was mainly due to a decrease in the category “Holidays” (-6.7%), which contributed to an effect of -0.17 ppts. The decrease in the “Transport” sector was mainly due to a decrease of 2.8% in the category “Operation of personal transport equipment”, which contributed to an effect of -0.24 ppts.

The increase in the “Housing” sector was mainly due to an increase in the category “Maintenance and repair of the dwelling” (1.6%), which contributed to an effect of 0.08 ppts. The increase in the “Miscellaneous goods and services” sector was due to an increase in the category “Personal care” (2.0%), which contributed to an effect of 0.08 ppts.

### Consumption basket

The consumption basket of the CPI consists of 408 goods and services. Compared to May 2023, 45.1% of these products had an increase in price, causing an effect of 0.79 ppts, while 37.5% showed a decrease, contributing to an effect of -1.16 ppts and the remaining 17.4% had no change in price. The prices of goods decreased by 0.5% and caused an influence of -0.28 ppts. The prices of services showed a decrease of 0.2% and had an influence of -0.09 ppts on the CPI of June 2023.

## Core inflation

The CPIC (core inflation) - CPI excluding the effect of energy and food – was 3.2% in June 2023. The energy index - which consists of the products: electricity, water, gasoline and diesel – was 15.3%. The food index showed an increase of 11.2%.



### What is CPIC?

The CPIC (core inflation) is a portion of the inflation where certain items, which have volatile price movements are excluded, such as food products and energy. When calculating the core inflation, the most volatile components are eliminated from the inflation. The core inflation index is used to assess the medium and long-term trends of the general level of prices. For purposes of economic policy-making, especially monetary policy, many economists focus on the proportion of the core inflation, as this allows a more in-depth evaluation of the recent inflation developments in the economy. The annual average of the CPI is used to calculate the CPIC.

The CPIC is calculated by comparing the average index for the most recent 12-month period compared with the preceding 12-month period.

The three main uses of a CPI are:

1. a calculation method to compensate employees due to the loss of purchasing power, adjusting their salaries, with the percentage change rate of the CPI, which is known as indexation.
2. a tool used in National Accounts to adjust components of the gross domestic product (GDP) from nominal terms to real terms. (For example, by eliminating the effect of the price changes from the consumption value)
3. a means commonly used by governments and central banks to set inflation targets.



## Subsistence level



The subsistence level for a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-15 years) in June 2023 is Afl. 5,336, a decrease of Afl. 18 compared to May 2023 (Afl. 5,354). The subsistence level for a single adult household is Afl. 2,541, a decrease of Afl. 9 compared to May 2023 (Afl. 2,550).

### What is the Subsistence level and how is it adjusted?

The CBS defines the subsistence level as the minimum level of income that is perceived as necessary for a person or family to be able to function in the society in an adequate and socially acceptable manner. When the definition of subsistence level is used, it refers in reality to a "Social subsistence level" and not the literal definition "the money needed to purchase those goods and services deemed necessary for living a life free of basic deprivation" (United Nations).

A subsistence level index was created by calculating the cost of the essential resources that an average adult consumes during a month. Each month this index is adjusted, based on the prices of food, clothing, shelter, transportation, and other items in the basket.

The current subsistence level is based on the "Subsistence level 2010" report published by the CBS in December 2010, and is updated monthly according to the CPI. The reference unit used in this report is of a household consisting of two adults and two children (0 to 14 years). The total weight of such household is 2.1 (1.0 + 0.5 + 0.3 + 0.3).



## The subsistence level in June 2023

The subsistence level is the minimum level of income which is perceived necessary to achieve an adequate standard of living in a given country. The subsistence level is usually determined by estimating the cost of all the essential resources that an average adult consumes in one month or year. This is commonly called a basic needs index, and varies according to the price of food, clothing, housing, transport and other items in the "basket". Equivalent scales are used to adjust the assumed standard of living, of households of different sizes and composition. The scale assigns a weight of 1.0 for the first adult and 0.5 for each additional adult in the household (aged 15+) and a weight of 0.3 for each child (aged 0-14 years). The subsistence level is based on figures of the report "Bestaansminimum 2010" and is monthly updated for inflation using the monthly CPI. The reference unit used in this report is a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-14 years).

In June 2023 the monthly subsistence level for a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-14 years) (Afl. 5,336) showed an increase of Afl. 266 compared to June 2022 (Afl. 5,070) and was mainly caused by increases of Afl. 149 and Afl. 133 in the sectors "Housing" and "Food and non-alcoholic beverages", respectively.

In June 2023, the monthly subsistence level for a single adult household is Afl 2,541, which represents an income deficit of Afl. 648, an increase of Afl. 49 compared to the deficit observed one year ago (Afl. 599). This deficit is the highest registered over a period of six (6) years for the month June.

## Change in prices of crude oil, utilities, gasoline and diesel in June 2023

The prices of utilities (electricity and water), gasoline and diesel are for the greater part determined by international crude oil prices. In June 2023 the average price per barrel of crude oil (US\$ 70.12) had a decrease of US\$ 1.74 (-2.4%) compared to May 2023 (US\$ 71.86).

The prices of electricity and water did not change compared to May 2023. Subsequently, the average electricity price per household remained at Afl. 274.57, while the average price of water per household remained at Afl. 168.73.

June 2023 the price of gasoline registered a decrease of Afl. 10.80 cents (-4.0%) and had an effect of -0.21 ppts on the CPI. The price of diesel registered a decrease of Afl. 12.40 cents (-5.6%) and had an effect of -0.02 ppt on the CPI of June 2023.

In June 2023, utilities, gasoline and diesel as a group, showed a decrease in price of 1.3% compared to May 2023, and had an influence of -0.23 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining 404 goods and services, as a group, show a decrease of 0.2% and had an effect of -0.15 ppts on the CPI.

## Change in prices of Food & catering services in June 2023

The “Food & catering services” index showed a decrease of 0.3% in June 2023, after an increase of 0.1% in May 2023. The index for “Food at home” showed a decrease of 0.4% in June, as seven (7) of the eleven (11) “Food at home” indices decreased in June 2023. The “Fruit” index registered the largest decrease (-2.2%) in June 2023. Furthermore, other significant decreases were posted in the indices for “Milk, cheese and eggs” (-1.4%), “Fish and other seafood” (-1.1%) and “Oils and fats” (-0.9%). The largest increase was registered in the index for “Sugar, jam, honey and other confectionery” (1.2%) in June 2023.

The index for “Food away from home” increased by 0.1% in June 2023.

In June 2023, “Food at home” and “Food away from home” as a group showed a decrease in price of 0.3% compared to May 2023, and had an effect of -0.04 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining goods and services, as a group, experienced a decrease in price of 0.4%, causing an effect of -0.33 ppts on the CPI.



## CPI for the period June 2022 – June 2023

### Consumer Price Index

Over the last 12 months, the CPI increased by 2.8%. Eight (8) of the twelve (12) sectors registered increases in prices. The increases that had the greatest influence on the CPI were registered for the “Housing” (10.2%), “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” (6.4%), “Miscellaneous goods and services” (2.9%), and “Restaurants and hotels” (6.9%) sectors, which contributed with an effect of 2.45, 0.72, 0.35 and 0.32 ppts, respectively. The increases in the remaining sectors had an effect of 0.22 ppts on the CPI of June 2022 - June 2023.



Aforementioned increases were partially offset mainly by decreases in the indices for the “Transport” (-4.7%) and “Communications” (-4.6%) sectors, causing an effect of -0.72 and -0.37 ppts, respectively.

The increase in the “Housing” sector was mainly due to increases in the categories “Electricity, gas and other fuels” (15.0%) and “Water supply and miscellaneous services relating to the dwelling” (19.1%), which contributed to an effect of respectively, 1.10 and 0.88 ppts. The increase in the “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” sector was mainly due to an increase in the category “Food” (6.0%), which contributed to an effect of 0.60 ppts. The increase in the “Miscellaneous goods and services” sector was mainly due to an increase in the category “Personal care” (5.3%), which contributed to an effect of 0.21 ppts. The increase in the “Restaurants and hotels” sector was due to an increase of 7.4% in the category “Catering services”, which contributed to an effect of 0.34 ppts.

The decrease in the “Transport” sector was mainly due to a decrease in the category “Operation of personal transport equipment” (-12.4%), which contributed to an effect of -1.24 ppts. The decrease in the “Communications” sector was due to a decrease of 5.5% in the category “Telephone and telefax services”, which contributed to an effect of -0.43 ppts.

### Consumption basket

Over the last year 64.5% of the products in the consumption basket had an increase in price, causing an effect of 6.28 ppts, while 29.2% showed a decrease, contributing to an effect of -3.44 ppts and the remaining 6.4% had no change in price. The prices of goods increased by 4.4% and caused an influence of 2.56 ppts. The prices of services showed an increase of 0.7% and had an influence of 0.29 ppts.

### Subsistence level

Over the last 12 months, the subsistence level for a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-15 years) registered an increase of Afl. 266, from Afl. 5,070 in June 2022 to Afl. 5,336 in June 2023. This increase was mainly due to increases in the “Housing” (Afl. 149) and “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” (Afl. 133) sectors.

### Change in prices of crude oil, utilities, gasoline and diesel

The average price per barrel of crude oil registered a decrease of US\$ 45.17 (-39.2%) from US\$ 115.29 in June 2022 to US\$ 70.12 in June 2023.

The energy index increased by 2.4% over the past 12 months and had an influence of 0.41 ppts. The indices of “Gasoline” (-20.3%) and “Diesel” (-28.0%) registered decreases over the last year, contributing with an effect of -1.30 and -0.13 ppts, respectively. The indices of “Electricity” (14.4%) and “Water” (23.1%) registered increases over the last year, contributing with an effect of 1.02 and 0.82 ppts, respectively. The remaining 404 goods and services, as a group, show an increase of 3.0% and had an effect of 2.43 ppts on the CPI.

### Change in prices of Food & catering services

Over the last 12 months, the “Food & catering services” increased by 6.7%. The “Food at home” index showed an increase of 6.4%, where ten (10) of the “Food at home” food groups increased over the period.

The “Food products n.e.c.” index increased by 11.6%, the largest increase among the “Food at home” food groups. Furthermore, other significant increases were posted in the indices for “Bread and cereals” (11.1%), “Sugar, jam, honey and other confectionery” (10.6%), “Non-alcoholic beverages” (9.0%), “Vegetables” (8.7%), “Milk, cheese and eggs” (6.7%), “Oils and fats” (4.4%), “Potatoes and other tubers” (3.4%), and “Meat” (2.3%).

The index for “Food away from home” increased by 7.4% over the last 12 months.
