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A note to the reader

The following report presents the price statistics for May 2026.

- At the end of May 2026, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) shows an increase of 1.0% compared to the index of April 2026. The sector which affected the CPI the most was “Transport” (3.3%), which led with an effect of 0.44 percentage points (ppts) on the Δ CPI of May 2026 (1.0%).
- Compared to May 2025 the CPI increased by 2.1%. The sector which affected the CPI the most, during this period, was “Transport” (8.4%), which led to an effect of 1.06 ppts.
- The period average inflation for the periods May 2023 to May 2024 and May 2025 to May 2026 is 0.4%, which is 0.7 ppts lower compared to the period average inflation for the periods May 2022 to May 2023 and May 2023 to May 2024 (1.1%). The sector which affected the CPI the most, during this period, was “Household operation” (-3.7%), which led to an effect of -0.32 ppts.
- The monthly subsistence level for a household consisting of two (2) adults and two (2) children (aged 0-14 years) increased by Afl. 131, from Afl. 5,510 in May 2025 to Afl. 5,641 in May 2026.
- Utilities (Water and Electricity) did not register price changes in May 2026. The price of gasoline registered an increase of 6.9% and had an effect of 0.32 ppts on the Δ CPI of May 2026. The price of diesel registered an increase of 4.3% in May 2026 and had an effect of 0.02 ppts on the Δ CPI of May 2026.

This report is divided in 7 sections. An overview of the monthly percentage changes in the CPI and index per sector is presented in section 1. Section 2 provides the yearly percentage changes in the CPI and index per sector. The development of indices of main sectors and utilities is outlined in section 3. Section 4 presents the percentage change in the CPI of Aruba’s major trading partners and compares the CPI of Aruba and the USA. Section 5 presents an overview of the monthly and yearly percentage changes of the core inflation. Section 6 presents the price movements in food & catering services. The development of the subsistence level is presented in section 7 and is followed by the appendices.

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1 Monthly change of the CPI

1.1 CPI and Inflation

The CPI of the total population of Aruba for the month of May 2026 is 111.90; an increase of 1.0% compared to the CPI of April 2026 (110.78). An overview of the percentage change in the CPI (Δ CPI) for different periods during 2025 and 2026 is shown in Table 1. The terms percentage change in the CPI and “inflation” (deflation) are considered similar and are used interchangeably. The inflation over the last 12 months (end of period inflation) is 2.1, while the inflation over a period of 24 months (period average inflation) is 0.4%.

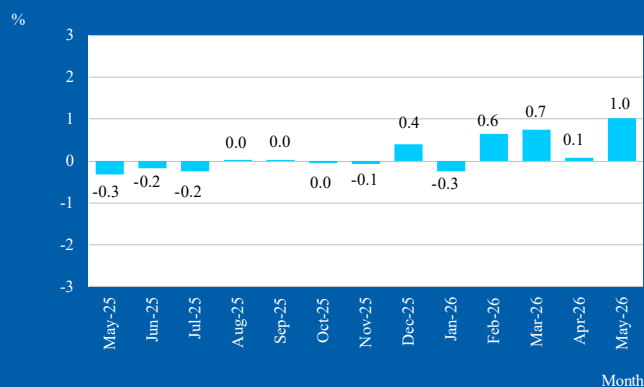


Figure 2: Monthly Δ CPI for May, 2017 - 2026

Figure 1 depicts the monthly Δ CPI over a period of one year starting from May 2025, whereas the Δ CPI for the month May for the years 2017 to 2026 is illustrated in Figure 2.

1.2 Changes in sector

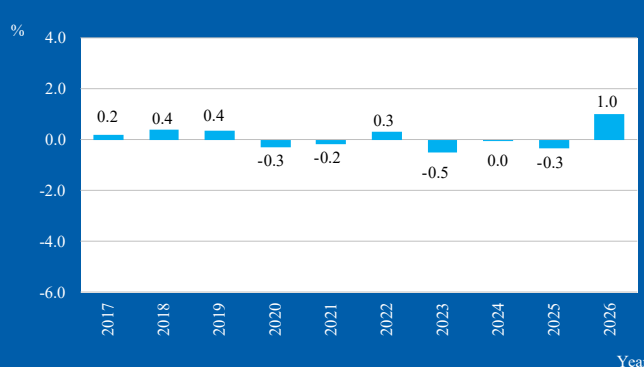
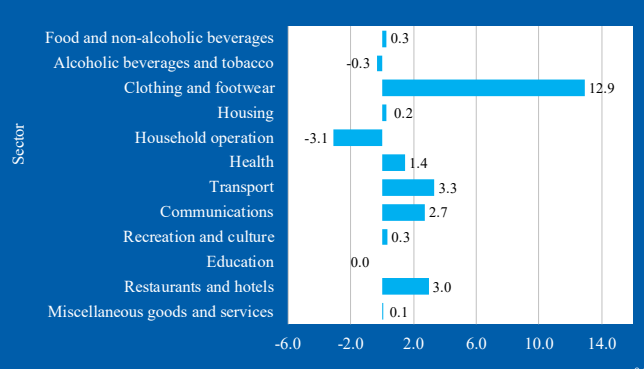


Figure 3: Δ I per sector, May 2026

Figure 3 provides an overview of the percentage changes for the indices per sector for May 2026. The percentage change in index is further denoted as Δ I. The largest Δ I is observed for the “Clothing and footwear” sector with an increase of 12.9%.

1.3 Changes in categories and subcategories

The largest positive and negative Δ I is seen in the categories “Accommodation services” (39.8%) and “Tools and equipment for house and garden” (-8.7%). In the “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” sector, increases of 0.3% and 0.2% were observed for the categories “Food” and “Non-alcoholic beverages”. In the “Housing” sector the major Δ I is observed for the category “Maintenance and repair of the dwelling” (0.9%). In the “Transport” sector the major Δ I is observed for the category “Operation of personal transport equipment” (4.2%). In the “Recreation and culture” sector the major Δ I is observed for the category “Audio-visual, photographic and information processing equipment” (-6.4%).

The categories which influenced the CPI calculation the most are “Operation of personal transport equipment”, “Telephone and telefax equipment” and “Clothing”, which had an effect of respectively, 0.35, 0.25 and 0.21 ppts on the Δ CPI. Reference is made to tables 16 and 17 in Appendices 1 and 2. Table 16 provides

an overview of the indices for the months May 2025, December 2025, April 2026 and May 2026 together with corresponding weights per sector and the monthly, year-to-date (ytd), end of period and period average percentage changes for May 2026. In table 17 an overview of the effect on the monthly, year-to-date (ytd), end of period and period average CPI per sector and category for May 2026 is presented. The course of indices for 2013 - up to May 2026 is illustrated in Appendix 5.

Figure 1: Monthly Δ CPI, 2025 - 2026

2 End of period change of the CPI

2.1 End of period change CPI for May 2026

The CPI increased from 109.58 in May 2025 to 111.90 in May 2026, an increase of 2.1%. This Δ CPI is the third lowest registered over a period of 6 years for the month of May and is 2.0 ppts higher than the Δ CPI registered in 2025 (0.1%) (see table 2).

2.2 Changes in sector

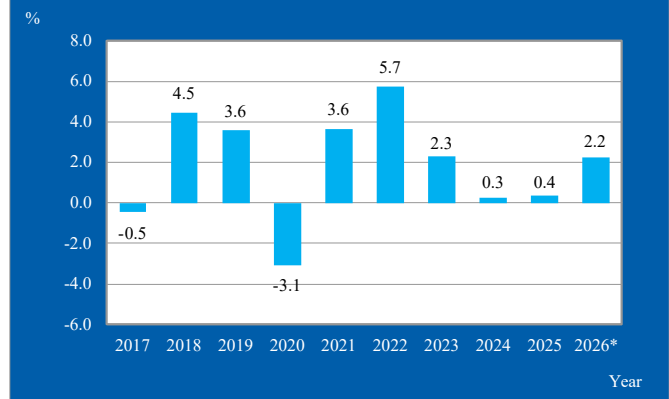
Figure 4: Δ I per sector for May, 2025 - 2026

An overview of the percentage change and effect per sector over the period May 2025 - May 2026 is presented in table 3. The largest increase is observed for the sector "Clothing and footwear" (12.9%). Furthermore, other significant increases are observed for the "Transport" (3.3%), "Restaurants and hotels" (3.0%) and "Communications" (2.7%) sectors. A comparison of the Δ I's for the years 2025 and 2026 is provided in figure 4.

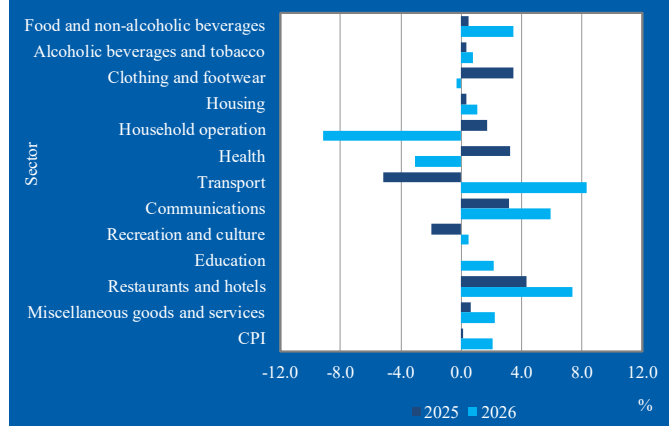

2.3 Changes in categories

The largest positive and negative Δ I in categories observed over a period of one year are respectively, "Accommodation services" (39.8%) and "Tools and equipment for house and garden" (-8.7%). For an overview of the end of period percentage changes per category refer to table 16 in Appendix 1.

2.4 End of year change CPI 2017 - 2026

The end of year Δ CPI for the period 2017 - 2026 is shown in figure 5. The Δ CPI for 2026 is calculated by comparing the CPI of May 2026 with the CPI of April 2026. The ytd Δ CPI for May 2026 is 2.2%.

2.5 Period average change CPI for May 2026

The period average change CPI (Δ ACPI) for May 2026 is 0.4%. Table 4 provides an overview of the Δ ACPI for the month May for the years 2022 to 2026. The Δ ACPI for 2026 decreased by 0.7 ppts compared to 2025 (1.1%).

3 Development of indices of main sectors and utilities

3.1 Indices main sectors

The four major sectors, “Housing”, “Transport”, “Food and non-alcoholic beverages” and “Recreation and culture”, constitute 58% of the total weight of the basket of goods and services, which are observed on a monthly basis. An overview of the course of indices for 2013 – up to May 2026 per sector and for the CPI is provided in figures 9-1 to 9-12 in Appendix 5.

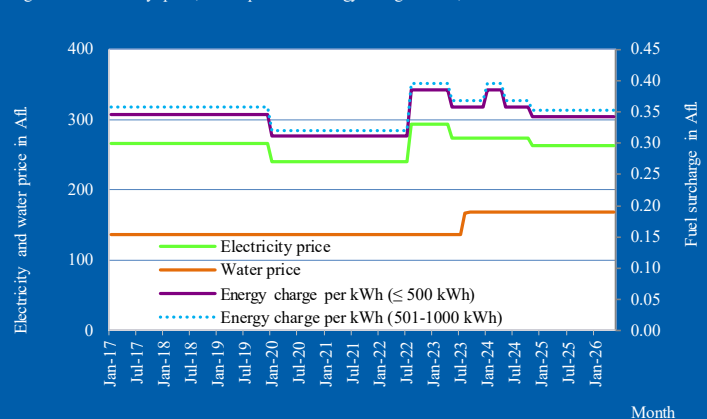
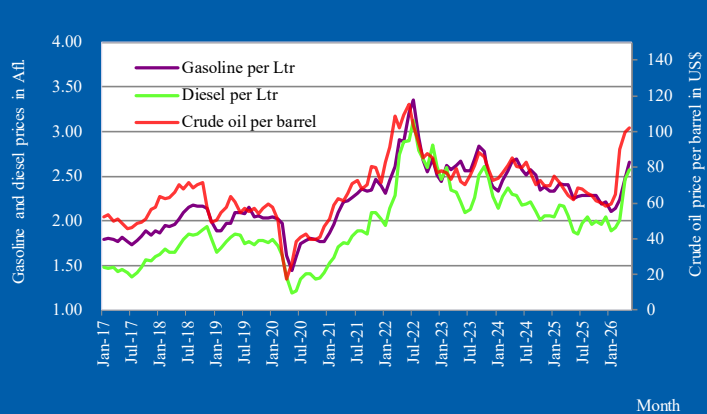


Figure 6-2 Gasoline, diesel and crude oil prices, 2017 - 2026

Changes in the indices of the sectors “Housing” and “Transport” are mainly the result of changes in the international oil prices and prices of utilities during the respective months. The development of crude oil, fuel surcharge, electricity, water, gasoline and diesel prices is provided in table 5 and in the adjoining figures 6-1 and 6-2.

3.2 Electricity

The price of electricity is determined in Aruban florins (Afl.) for an average usage by households. The average usage is 725.5 kWh per month. The electricity price for an average consumption of 725.5 kWh did not change in May 2026, it remained at Afl. 263.67. Figure 6-1 provides an overview of the course of changes in the electricity price for the period 2017 to 2026.

The total energy charge per kWh for the usage of electricity up to 500 kWh did not change in May 2026, it stayed at Afl. 34.31 cents per kWh. The total energy charge per kWh for the usage of electricity between 501 - 1000 kWh did not change in May 2026, it stayed at Afl. 35.31 cents per kWh.

3.3 Water

The price of water is determined in Afl. for an average usage (water consumption) by households. Figure 6-1 provides an overview of the course of changes in the water price for the period 2017 to 2026. The water price for an average usage by households did not change in May 2026, it remained at Afl. 168.73.

3.4 Gasoline and Diesel

The retail price of gasoline registered an increase of 6.9% from 248.0 in April 2026 to 265.2 in May 2026. The retail price of diesel registered an increase of 4.3% from 246.5 cents per liter in April 2026 to 257.0 cents per liter in May 2026.

Figure 6-1 Electricity price, water price and energy charge in Afl., 2017 - 2026

4 Percentage change CPI of Aruba's major trading partners

4.1 Comparison of the CPI of Aruba and the USA

Table 6 provides an overview of the Δ CPI of Aruba's major trading partners starting from May 2025. In May 2026 the Δ CPI of the USA and the Netherlands were 0.6% and 0.1%, respectively. The Δ CPI of Curaçao for May 2026 is not yet available.

The USA is considered Aruba's largest trading partner². Table 7 provides an overview of the Δ CPI for Aruba and the USA in May 2026. Aruba's monthly Δ CPI for May 2026 is 0.4 ppts higher than the Δ CPI of the USA.

The Δ CPI of Aruba over the last 12 months is 2.1 ppts lower than the USA's 12-month Δ CPI. The Δ CPI over the last 24 months for Aruba is 2.6 ppts lower than the Δ CPI of the USA. Figure 7: Monthly Δ CPI for Aruba and the USA, 2024 - 2025

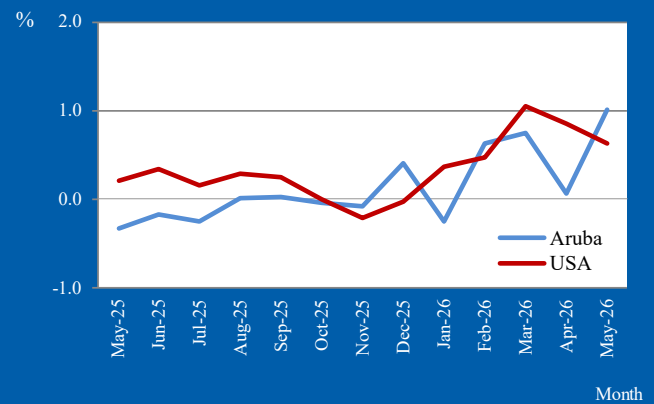
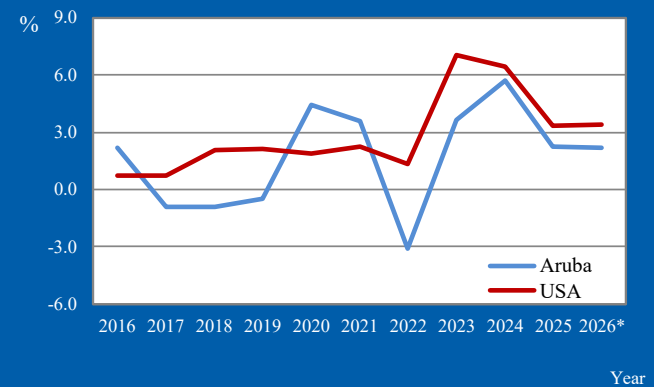


Figure 8: End of year Δ CPI, 2015 - 2025

5 Core inflation

5.1 Core inflation

Core inflation is a measure of inflation which excludes certain items that face volatile price movements e.g. food products and energy. By calculating the core inflation these more volatile components are eliminated from the inflation. Core inflation indices serve to assess the mid- and long-term trend of the overall price level. For the purpose of adjusting monetary policy, many economists focus more intently on the core rate of inflation, as this allows for an in-depth assessment of inflationary processes ongoing in the economy.

5.2 Monthly change of the core inflation

In May 2026 the core inflation (measured over the period May 2024 - 2026) was 0.9%. In May 2026 the food index was 1.2%, while the energy index shows a decrease of 2.3%.

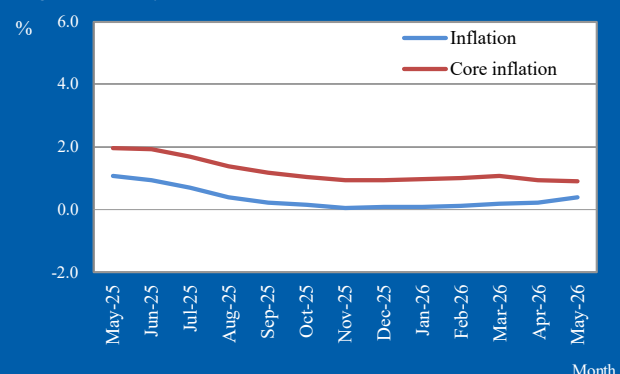

5.3 End of year change of the core inflation, 2021 - 2026

The end of year core inflation of the total population of Aruba for the year 2026 (up to May) is 0.9%, a decrease of 0.1 ppt compared to the core inflation of 2025 (1.0%). Table 10 provides an overview of the end of year inflation and core inflation over the period 2021 - 2026.

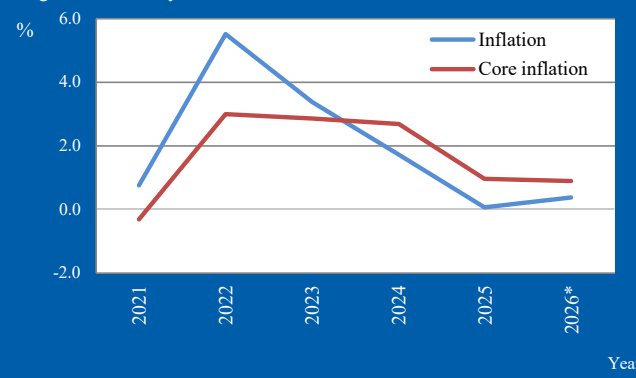

6 Development of Food & catering services

6.1 Monthly change of Food & catering services for May 2026

The “Food & catering services” index showed an increase of 0.5% in May 2026, after having increased 0.3% in April 2026. The index for “Food at home” showed an increase of 0.3% in May, as seven (7) of the eleven (11) “Food at home” indices increased in May 2026. The “Vegetables” index registered the largest increase (2.8%) in May 2026. Furthermore, other significant increases were posted in the indices for “Fruit” (2.5%), “Fish and other seafood” (1.4%) and “Sugar, jam, honey and other confectionery” (1.2%). The largest decrease in May 2026 was registered for the index of “Potatoes and other tubers” (-4.3%).

The index for “Food away from home” shows an increase of 0.9% in May 2026.

Table 11 provides an overview of the corresponding weights per food group together with the percentage changes and effect for May 2026.

In May 2026, “Food at home” and “Food away from home” as a group showed an increase in price of 0.5% compared to April 2026 and had an effect of 0.08 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining goods and services, as a group, experienced an increase in price of 1.1%, causing an effect of 0.93 ppts on the CPI.

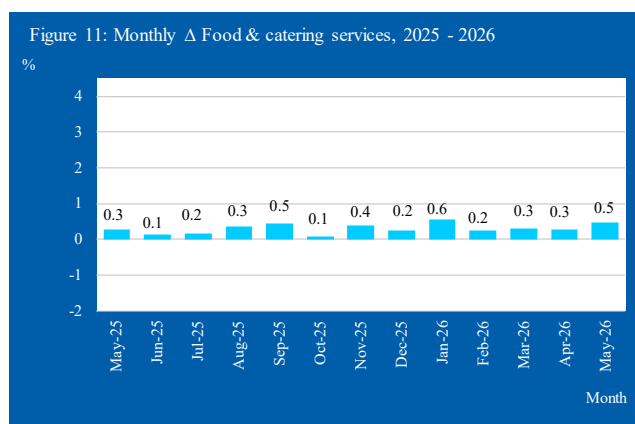

6.2 End of Period change of Food & catering services for May 2026

Over the last 12 months, the “Food & catering services” increased by 3.7%. The “Food at home” index showed an increase of 3.4%, where nine (9) of the “Food at home” food groups increased over this period.

The “Vegetables” index increased by 11.3%, the largest increase among the “Food at home” food groups. Furthermore, other significant increases were posted in the indices for “Sugar, jam, honey and other confectionery” (8.1%), “Fruit” (6.6%), “Non-alcoholic beverages” (4.1%), “Food products n.e.c.” (4.0%) and “Oils and fats” (3.3%). The largest decrease during this period was registered in the index for “Potatoes and other tubers” (-9.1%).

The index for “Food away from home” increased by 4.4% over the last 12 months.

Table 18 provides an overview of the monthly and end of period percentage changes and effect for May 2026 for the food groups.

7 Subsistence level

7.1 Subsistence level

The subsistence level is the minimum level of income which is perceived necessary to achieve an adequate standard of living in a given country. The subsistence level is usually determined by estimating the cost of all the essential resources that an average adult consumes in one month or year. This is commonly called a basic needs index, and varies according to the price of food, clothing, housing, transport and other items in the "basket". Equivalence scales are used to adjust for the assumed standard of living, of households of different sizes and composition. The scale assigns a weight of 1.0 for the first adult and 0.5 for each additional adult in the household (aged 15+) and a weight of 0.3 for each child (aged 0-14 years). The subsistence level is based on figures of the report "Bestaansminimum 2010" published by the CBS in December 2010 and is monthly updated for inflation using the monthly CPI. The reference unit used in this report is one of a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years).

7.2 Monthly change of the subsistence level for May 2026

Table 13 provides an overview of the subsistence level for a family of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years) by sector registered over a period of 5 years for the month of May. Over a period of one year the subsistence level increased by Afl. 131, from Afl. 5,510 in May 2025 to Afl. 5,641 in May 2026. The "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" (Afl. 80) sector shows the largest increase over this period. The largest decrease in May 2026 was registered for the "Household operation" sector (Afl. -11).

7.3 Comparison of the subsistence level and minimum wage

In May 2026 the subsistence level for a single adult household is Afl. 2,686, which represents an income deficit of Afl. 679, an increase of Afl. 41 compared to the deficit observed one year ago (Afl. 638). This deficit is the highest registered over a period of six years for the month of May.

For clarification, two columns were added to Table 15: (1) the income supplement ("reparatietoeslag"), which provides additional support to eligible workers; and (2) the estimated income deficit, which is reduced by this supplement, thereby improving the financial position of minimum-wage earners. The current approach will be maintained to ensure consistency and comparability.

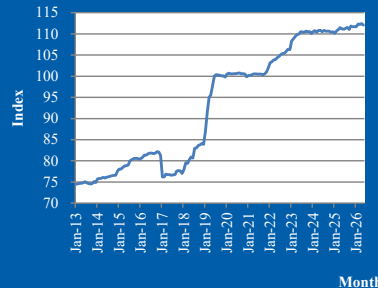


Figure 9-3: Clothing and footwear

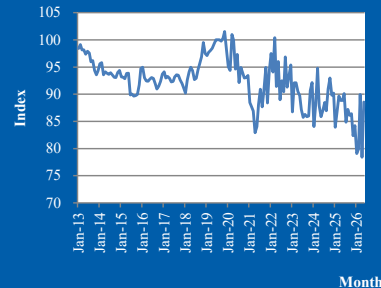


Figure 9.4 : Housing

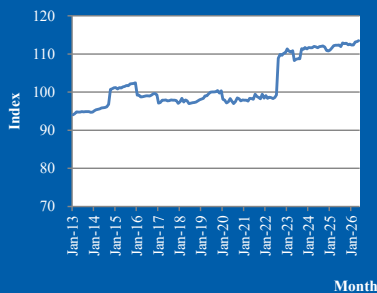


Figure 9.5 : Household operation

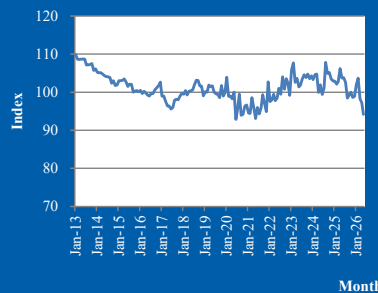


Figure 9.6 : Health

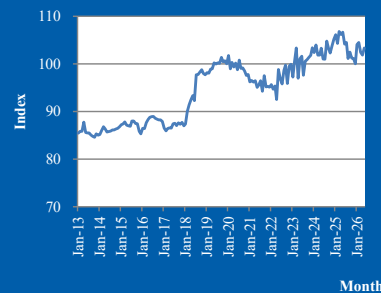


Figure 9.7 : Transport

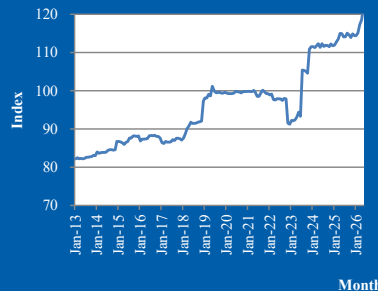


Figure 9.9 : Recreation and culture

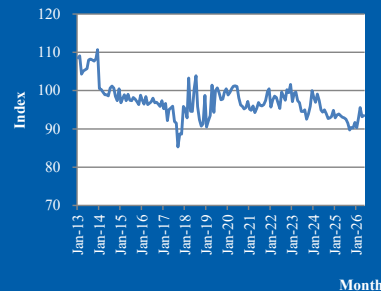


Figure 9.10 : Education

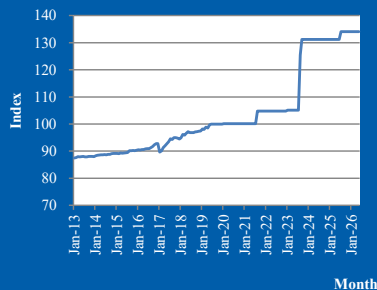
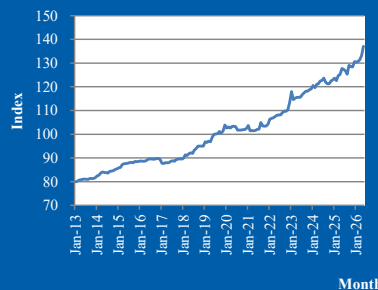
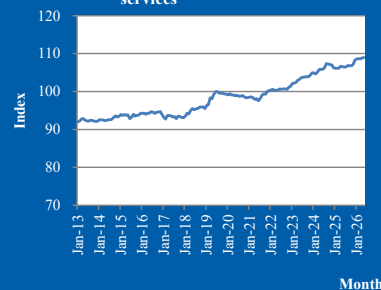


Figure 9.11 : Restaurants and hotels

Glossary

The Consumer Price Index and Inflation

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) measures changes in prices of consumer goods and services by households. Consumer price indices can be intended to measure either the rate of price inflation or deflation as perceived by households or changes in their cost of living. In case of inflation, the percentage change is positive, and it indicates a decrease in the purchasing power of the consumers.

Monthly percentage change

Percentage change in price indices of any aggregates of the CPI in relation to the respective price indices of the previous month.

Year-to-date (ytd)

Percentage change in price indices of any aggregates of the CPI in relation to the respective price indices of December prior to the year under review.

End of period inflation (last 12 months)

Percentage change in price indices of any aggregates of the CPI in relation to the respective price indices of the same month of the previous year.

Period average inflation (last 24 months)

Period average inflation is the percentage change between the annual average CPI for the reference period and the annual average CPI for the same period in the previous year. The annual average CPI is calculated as the arithmetic mean of the monthly CPI indices over the period.

Effect

Contribution of all percentage changes (of all respective aggregates) to the CPI.

Core inflation

Core inflation is a measure of inflation that excludes certain items which face volatile price movements. Core inflation eliminates the inflation of certain products that can have temporary price shocks because these shocks can diverge from the overall trend of inflation and give a false measure of inflation. The core rate of inflation is calculated by: total inflation excluding food and energy prices. In part, that is because the core is less volatile and reflects better the relationship of supply and demand in domestic product markets. The core usually is a better measure of the basic rate of inflation that will tend to emerge in the absence of supply shocks.

Food & catering services

The “Food & catering services” index is composed of the indices for the “Food & Non-alcoholic beverages” sector (“Food at home”) and the “Catering services” (“Food away from home”) category.

Subsistence level

The subsistence level is the minimum level of income, which is perceived necessary to achieve an adequate standard of living in a given country. The subsistence level is usually determined by estimating the cost of all the essential resources that an average adult consumes in one month or year. This is commonly called a basic needs index, and varies according to the price of food, clothing, housing, transport and other items in the “basket”. The subsistence level is monthly updated for inflation using the monthly CPI.
