Consumer Price Index, base period December 2006

June 2014

The Central Bureau of Statistics presents the most important findings for the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the month of June 2014.

The CPI for June 2014 is 117.63, an increase of 0.1% compared to the index of May 2014 (117.54) and accumulating an increase of 0.6% up to and including June of this year.

The percentage change of the CPI over the last 12 months (June 2013 to June 2014) is 0.2, an increase of 3.3 percentage points (ppts) compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (-3.1).

The period average percentage change of the CPI for the period June 2013 - June 2014 is -0.7, an increase of 2.1 ppts compared to the period average percentage change over the period June 2012 - June 2013 (-2.8).

During this month, seven of the twelve sectors registered increases in prices. The increases which had the greatest influence on the CPI were registered for the "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" (0.2%), "Recreation and culture" (0.3%), "Transport" (0.1%) and "Housing" (0.1%) sectors, causing an effect of 0.03, 0.02, 0.02 and 0.02 ppts, respectively. The increases in the remaining sectors had a total effect of 0.01 ppt on the CPI of June 2014.

Aforementioned increases were partially offset mainly by decreases in the indices for the "Clothing and footwear" sector (-0.2%) and "Restaurants and hotels" sector (-0.2%), which had an influence of respectively, -0.01 ppt each. The decreases in the remaining sectors had a total effect of -0.01 ppt on the CPI of June 2014.

The increase in the "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" sector was mainly due to an increase in the category "Food" (0.2%), which contributed to an effect of 0.03 ppts. The increase in the "Recreation and culture" sector was mainly caused by an increase in the category "Holidays" (12.1%), which contributed to an effect of 0.07 ppts. The increase in the "Transport" sector was caused by an increase in the category "Transport services" (6.5%), which contributed to an effect of 0.10 ppts. The increase in the "Housing" sector was caused by an increase in the category "Actual rentals for housing" (0.1%), which contributed to an effect of 0.02 ppts.

The decrease in the "Clothing and footwear" sector was mainly due to a decrease of 0.2% in the category "Clothing ", which contributed to an effect of -0.01 ppt. The decrease in the "Restaurants and hotels" sector was mainly caused by a decrease in the category "Accommodation services" (-8.8%), which contributed to an effect of -0.01 ppt.

The consumption basket of the CPI consists of 452 goods and services. Compared to May 2014, 35.4% of these products had an increase in price, causing an effect of 0.49 ppts, while 29.4% showed a decrease, contributing to an effect of -0.42 ppts and the remaining 35.2% had no change in price. The prices of goods decreased by 0.2% and caused an influence of -0.12 ppts. The prices of services show an increase of 0.5% and had an influence of 0.20 ppts. The CPIC (core inflation) - CPI excluding the effect of energy and food - registered in June 2014 an increase of 0.1%, which is 0.3 ppts higher compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (-0.2%). The energy index - which consists of the products: electricity, water, gasoline and diesel - registered a decrease of 5.4%, which is 6.4 ppts higher compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (-1.1.8%). The food index shows an increase of 0.1%, which is 0.2 ppts lower compared to the percentage change for the same period of last year (0.3%).

The subsistence level for a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years) in June 2014 is Afl. 4,289, while for a single adult household it is Afl. 2,042.

Change in prices of crude oil, utilities, gasoline and diesel in June 2014

The prices of utilities (electricity and water), gasoline and diesel are for the greater part determined by international crude oil prices. In June 2014 the average price per barrel of crude oil (US\$ 105.78) had an increase of US\$ 3.68 (3.6%) compared to May 2014 (US\$ 102.10).

Fuel surcharge for a usage of electricity up to 500 kWh did not change in June 2014, it stayed at Afl. 24.60 cents per kWh. Fuel surcharge for a usage of electricity between 501 -1000 kWh did not change in June 2014, it stayed at Afl. 30.90 cents per kWh. The prices of electricity and water did not change compared to May 2014. Subsequently, the average electricity price per household remained at Afl. 306.75, while the average price of water per household remained at Afl. 137.05.

In June 2014 the price of gasoline decreased by Afl. 0.02 (-0.9%) causing an effect of -0.06 ppts on the CPI. The price of diesel registered a decrease of Afl. 0.01 (-0.7%) and had an insignificant effect on the CPI of June 2014.

In June 2014, utilities, gasoline and diesel as a group show a decrease in price of 0.3% compared to May 2014, and had an influence of -0.06 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining 448 goods and services, as a group, experienced an increase of 0.2% in price, causing an effect of 0.14 ppts on the CPI.

Change in prices of Food & catering services in June 2014

The "Food & catering services" index shows an increase of 0.2% in June 2014, after an increase of 0.3% in May 2014. The index for "Food at home" shows an increase of 0.2% in June, as eight of the eleven "Food at home" indices increased in June 2014. The "Fish and other seafood" index registered the largest increase (1.5%) in June and was caused by an increase of 1.5% in the index for "Fish and seafood preparations". Furthermore, increases of 1.3% and 1.0% were posted in the indices for "Food products n.e.c." and "Fruit", respectively. The "Potatoes and other tubers" index registered the largest decrease (-5.1%), its fifth, followed by decreases of 0.5% and 0.1% in the indices for "Vegetables" and "Oils and fats".

Over the last 12 months the "Food & catering services" index has increased by 1.5%. The "Food at home" index shows an increase of 1.3%. The "Potatoes and other tubers" index increased by 8.6%, the largest increase among the "Food at home" food groups, while the "Vegetables" index shows the largest decrease (-4.2%).

The index for "Food away from home" shows a decrease of 0.03% in June, after a slight decrease of 0.01% in May 2014 and has increased by 2.4% over the last 12 months.

In June 2014, "Food at home" and "Food away from home" as a group show an increase in price of 0.2% compared to May 2014, and had an influence of 0.03 ppts on the CPI, while the remaining goods and services, as a group, experienced an increase in price of 0.1%, causing an effect of 0.05 ppts on the CPI.

The subsistence level in June 2014

The subsistence level is the minimum level of income which is perceived necessary to achieve an adequate standard of living in a given country. The subsistence level is usually determined by estimating the cost of all the essential resources that an average adult consumes in one month or year. This is commonly called a basic needs index, and varies according to the price of food, clothing, housing, transport and other items in the "basket". Equivalence scales are used to adjust for the assumed standard of living, of households of different sizes and composition. The scale assigns a weight of 1.0 for the first adult and 0.5 for each additional adult in the household (aged 15+) and a weight of 0.3 for each child (aged 0-14 years). The subsistence level is based on figures of the report "Bestaansminimum 2010" published by the CBS in November 2010 and is monthly updated for inflation using the monthly CPI. The reference unit used in this report is a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years).

In June 2014 the subsistence level for a household consisting of two adults and two children (aged 0-14 years) (Afl. 4,289) shows an increase of Afl. 11 compared to June 2013 (Afl. 4,278) and was mainly caused by an increase of Afl. 21 in the "Food and non-alcoholic beverages" sector.
